# Botanical Highlights

Botanic gardens play an important role in conservation by growing and researching diverse collections of plants, including threatened species.

**Australian Forest (B4)**  
Explore the diversity of Australian plants and spectacular trees in this tranquil green oasis.

**Botanic Park/Tainmuntilla**  
Adjoining the Garden, this large arboretum has significant plant conservation value and historic importance. It is also home to a colony of Grey-headed Flying-foxes, which play a vital role in the ecosystem.

**Economic Garden (C2)**  
Learn what a variety of fibres, oils, herbs and spices look like in their living plant form before they are harvested and processed.

**First Creek Wetland (D5)**  
Discover how beautiful, essential and useful wetlands are for maintaining a healthy environment, and see abundant wildlife including turtles, frogs, birds and insects.

**International Rose Garden (B6)**  
Adelaide's mediterranean climate makes it the natural home for roses in Australia. Stroll amongst hundreds of varieties. Roses flower from October to April.

**Mediterranean Garden (C4)**  
Developed to inspire home gardeners, this demonstration garden highlights water-wise plants suited to our local climate.

**Rangelands Garden (C6)**  
Grown from seed and cuttings collected by our SA Seed Conservation Centre, the rare arid zone plants displayed here bring the outback to the city.

# Buildings & Architecture

As you journey through the Garden, you will encounter several eras of architecture, statues and fountains.

**Museum of Economic Botany (D4)**  
One of the last of its kind, this exquisite museum showcases how plants have been used historically for food, fibre, dyes and medicine around the globe. It also hosts a program of fascinating art exhibitions.

**Amazon Waterlily Pavillion (D3)**  
Home to a waterlily from South America's Amazon River, boasting giant leaves up to two metres in diameter and spectacular flowers.

**Palm House (D2)**  
Featuring a rare collection of plants from Madagascar, this stunning 1877-built glass house is one of the last of its kind in the world.

**Bicentennial Conservatory (C5)**  
Meander through the temperate rainforest plants and impressive canopy of trees that make up this lush ecosystem.

**Simpson Shadehouse (C4)**  
Find inspiration for your garden's shaded areas and verandas here.

**State Herbarium (C6)**  
Our science team, located in the old Tram Barn, conducts vital research that generates and shares new botanical knowledge. They serve as a key hub for plant, fungi, and algae science in South Australia.

**Accessibility**  
Adelaide Botanic Garden is wheelchair accessible through all gates except the Hackney Gate. Bitumen paths run throughout the garden.
