Expression of Interest (EOI) Gladstone Gaol





Introduction

The Department for Environment and Water invites Expressions of Interest (EOI) from parties interested in activating Gladstone GaoI through innovative and sustainable proposals.

The state heritage-listed former Gladstone Gaol operated between 1881 and 1975 as a medium security prison, and as a military detention barracks during World War II. The Gaol permanently closed in 1975, and in 1978 was reopened to visitors offering historic tours.

The EOI process seeks proposals for tourism, commercial, community or residential opportunities that will enhance the site's value for the community, visitors, and stakeholders. Proposals may involve ongoing, seasonal, one-off, exclusive, or non-exclusive activations and may include lease, licence, or purchase arrangements provided they align with the strategic vision for the site.

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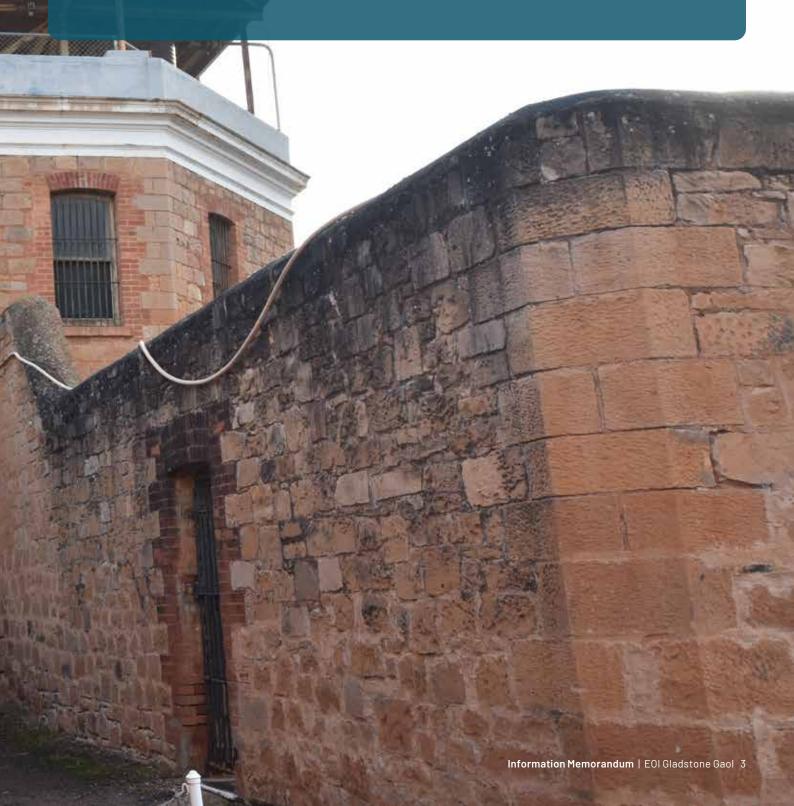
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Executive summary

The Gladstone Gaol is a unique location of historical and cultural significance. This EOI process presents an opportunity for visionary operators, community groups, and individuals to deliver proposals that:

- Activate the site through innovative uses.
- Respect its heritage and cultural values.
- Provide sustainable economic and social benefits.
- Create a destination for the community, visitors, and the broader region.



The opportunity

The site offers flexibility and diversity for proponents, with opportunities to deliver:

- Tourism-focused services or facilities (e.g. guided experiences, cultural interpretation, events, or hospitality).
- Commercial ventures that align with the character and strategic priorities of the site.
- Community uses that engage and benefit local residents and visitors.
- Residential or mixed use through the purchase of land outside the Gaol walls.

Proponents may seek tenure under:



Lease for exclusive, ongoing operations or developments.



Licence for non-exclusive, time-limited activations or seasonal activities or events.



Purchase only for land outside the Gaol walls.

Site Condition

Gladstone Gaol is listed on the State Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place (registration no. 16386). The Gaol (including the surrounding gaol walls) are not being considered for disposal.

Due to the age and historic use of site, applicants must undertake their own enquiries and satisfy themselves in respect of all matters to determine the suitability of the property for any form of development.

The buildings and structures on the site are of heritage significance and may require ongoing maintenance, repair, or upgrades. Proponents are advised that any works, including repair, fit-out, alteration, or development as well as any upgrades necessary to ensure compliance with current building codes, safety, accessibility, or operational requirements, are the sole responsibility of the applicant and should reference the principles and policies documented in the Gladstone Gaol Conservation Management Plan. All proposed works must be undertaken in a manner that is sensitive to the sites heritage values and must comply with relevant planning, heritage, crown lands, and building legislation and regulations.

Applicants are advised that the site may contain environmental contamination. It is the sole responsibility of proponents to undertake their own due diligence, investigations, and assessments to determine the suitability of the land for their proposed use or development.

Neither the Minister or the Department for Environment and Water nor its representatives provide any warranty

regarding the site's condition, and applicants must satisfy themselves as to any risks, restrictions, or remediation requirements associated with their proposal.

Any works that result in demolition, removal, conversion, alteration, painting of, or addition to, the place or any other work that could materially affect the heritage value of the place requires Development Approval under the *Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016*, and must also comply with Crown Land Management Act 2009 and Heritage Places Act 1993 (SA).

Exclusion of Tenanted Land

A portion of the property is currently subject to a residential tenancy agreement and is therefore excluded from the EOI process.

Exclusion of Community Garden Area

A designated portion of the site has been earmarked for the development of a community garden and is not available for inclusion in proposals under this EOI. Proponents should ensure that their submissions respect this exclusion and consider opportunities to complement or integrate with the community garden initiative where appropriate.



Terms and conditions

The Department for Environment and Water (DEW) retains the right to vary or abandon the EOI process at any time. DEW is not obliged to proceed with, or negotiate, in respect to any EOI.

The invitation for an EOI is not:

- a commitment of any kind and does not necessarily indicate an intention by DEW to enter into legal relations with any party or
- to be interpreted as creating a binding contract (including a process contract) between DEW and the applicant or giving rise to any:
 - contractual, quasi-contractual, restitutionary or promissory estoppel rights or

What is the assessment criteria?

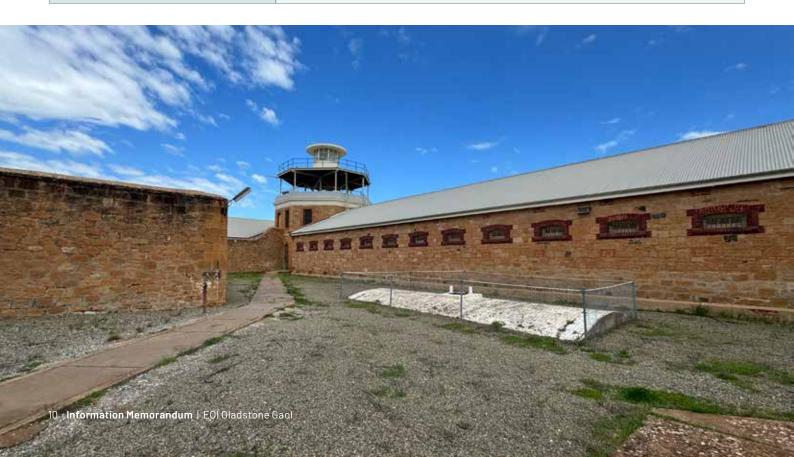
Submissions will be assessed against three weighted criteria:



Criteria 1 – Proposal Concept and Alignment with Strategic Priorities 30%

Applicants need to demonstrate that their proposal strongly aligns with the strategic vision, objectives, and intended outcomes for the site, and clearly contributes to its activation and growth.

Criteria 2 - Heritage Sensitivity, Social and Cultural Benefit 35%

Applicants need to demonstrate that their proposal respects the site's heritage values, enhances cultural and social connections, and provides tangible benefits to the local community and visitors.

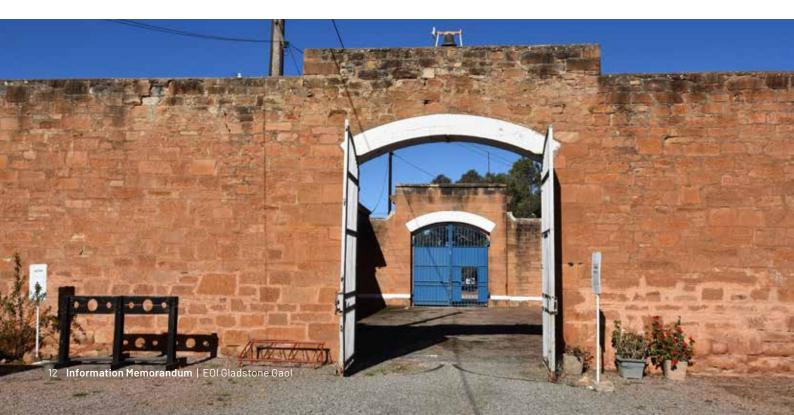
Criteria 3 - Proposal Sustainability and Proponent Capability 35%

Applicants need to demonstrate that their proposal is financially and operationally sustainable, backed by the capability, resources, and experience required to successfully deliver, operate, and maintain the activation.

Criterion element	Supporting information/evidence may include:
What are your proposed fit-out, costs, implementation, and timeframes?	 Applicants should consider: What works, fit-outs, or developments are required to deliver your proposal? What is the estimated cost for each component? What is your proposed implementation schedule, including milestones and completion dates?
What strategies will you implement to ensure the financial and operational sustainability of your proposal?	 Applicants should consider: What are your key funding sources and assumptions? How will you manage operational risks and ensure ongoing viability? How will you adapt to seasonal changes, market shifts, or unforeseen challenges? How will the proposal fill a demonstrated gap in the market?

Assessment will consider concept quality, strategic alignment, heritage sensitivity, financial and operational viability, and the applicant's capability and track record.
