The purpose of this State Heritage nomination is to ensure both original sandstone Villa's on "site" + Sandstone Fence + The Memorial Rose Plantings on Fullarton Road are listed for preservation (in a similar fashion to the WWI Plantations on Alexandra Avenue nearby). In so doing, preserving the War Widow's legacy, as attached to the site, both <u>Vasey House</u> and the "second" sandstone Villa - "<u>Jean Rouse" Villa</u> , named after the first SA member and office holder of the War Widow's Guild SA (<u>appendix attached on Jean Rouse</u>).

C. History

6. Origins and history	
Years of Construction:	Both Vasey House & Jean Rouse Villa were constructed between 1898-1900 after an auction of land in the new Rose Park subdivision in 1898 (archive details attached below).
History of the nominated place:	1899-1900 – The two original sandstone residences on the current site facing Fullarton Road were constructed, with records indicating Vasey House was built for local land agent (Richard Verco). While Jean Rouse Villa was constructed on land purchased by successful local business owner and philanthropist Thomas (Thom) Rhodes - who lived and worked in nearby Kent Town for much of his life, after emigrating from Birmingham (England) with his family at the age of 10 in 1849. Mr Rhodes later passing away aged 77 in 1916. The original records of the Rose Park Auction of 1898 indicated Mr Rhodes purchased Lots 8,9 and 10 fronting what was then known as “Government Road”.

Jean's HUSBAND - Maxwell Hainsworth ROUSE was born on 2nd January 1913 in Port Pirie, South Australia His parents were Hainsworth Frederick John ROUSE & Sarah Elizabeth FIELD who married in South Australia in 1909. He married "Jeanie" Scriven BLYTH (Jean ROUSE) on 17th Oct 1940. Mr Rouse sadly died in 1945 during his time as a POW in Borneo (WWII).






MR. THOMAS RHODES.

A FINE CITIZEN DEAD.

General regret will be felt at the death of Mr. Thomas Rhodes, which occurred at his residence in Payneham road on Tuesday evening. For some time he had been ill, rheumatism and heart trouble having afflicted him sorely. He was taken ill on Christmas Day, and appeared to be recovering, when he was seized with another bad attack on Monday, from which he did not rally.

The deceased occupied a niche which will be hard to fill. Philanthropic work claimed much of his time, yet he was always closely associated with the widely known business which bears his name. The Adelaide business house of W. and T. Rhodes is a firm known to old and young. Mr. Thomas Rhodes was born at Birmingham, England, in 1839, and attained his 77th birthday on October 16 last.

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THE LATE MR. THOMAS RHODES.

Mr. Thomas Rhodes was born seventy-seven years ago, at Fillingley, near Birmingham, and came to South Australia with his parents when ten years of age. Most of the time since then he lived and worked amongst the people of Kent Town. Following the steps of his father (Mr. Geo. Rhodes) and his elder brother (Mr. Wm. Rhodes), he built up a great business from small beginnings, and secured the confidence and esteem of his employes and a good name amongst the mercantile members of the community. He held many a public position, fulfilling all the duties he undertook with conscientious thoroughness, combined with tact and courtesy. He was a member of the School Board of Adelaide, member and then chairman of the Norwood School Board, member of Prince Alfred College Committee, and most assiduous in his attention to all the interests of that great school. From its inception he was a member of the Y.M.C.A., and for many years president of the State Children's Council.

loved so well. "Lord, I have loved the habitation of Thine house and the place where Thine honour dwelleth" was as true of Thomas Rhodes as it was of the singer of old. How he loved the Kent Town church!—loved the building, the appointments, the orderly worship, and above all, "the inward and spiritual grace" of which they are but "the outward and visible sign." 7. Statement of State significance - Why is this place important to the State of South Australia?

This place is of State Heritage significance, with the Fullarton Road site far more than two beautiful Sandstone Villas + Sandstone Wall + Memorial Rose Plantings—it is a living testament to South Australia's social history, and the enduring legacy of the War Widows Guild (SA) Inc. **Vasey House**, already recognized as a Local Heritage Place, which stands alongside the equally significant **Jean Rouse Villa**, named in honour of the Guild's first South Australian member. Together, the site and these two villas represent a unique chapter in our state's story—one of resilience, community, and service of these amazing women.

For over 60 years, this site has been a sanctuary for South Australian war widows and their families, a place where lives were rebuilt and support networks flourished. The two main buildings architectural integrity, and historical association make it irreplaceable. Protecting the site (primarily these two buildings, the stone wall, and memorial rose plantings) under **State Heritage listing** would ensure that both sandstone villas—and the profound social contribution they symbolise—remain safeguarded for future generations.

This is not just about preserving buildings / structures; it is about honouring the women who carried the weight of war's aftermath and created a legacy of care and solidarity on this site for six decades. By elevating this site to State Heritage status, we affirm its cultural significance and secure its place in South Australia's heritage landscape, together with honouring the strength and resilience of these amazing women.

Jean Rouse went on to undertake significant work for the Guild in its early years, holding several office roles within the Guild in forming this key part of SA's post WWII community. Jean Rouse passed away in 1983 while living at what is now Jean Rouse House.

Importantly **Vasey House** (already listed for "Local Heritage status) was named in honour of the founding member of the War Widow's Guild movement nationally **Mrs Jessie Vasey OBE CBE (1897-1966)**.







JEAN ROUSE VILLA – 141 FULLARTON ROAD, ROSE PARK

THE STORY OF JEAN (JEANIE) ROUSE (nee BLYTH)

When on a daily walk, I have often admired an architecturally attractive old building at 141 Fullarton Road that is part of the Australian War Widows Guild in South Australia.

Along Fullarton Road, the past residents who have lived in houses along this road, and who have contributed to the foundation of the early history of Adelaide, spring to mind. Rev George Davidson, Robert Charlick, Richard Verco, John Vincent, Hermann Homburg, Heinrich Krawindel and Edward Spicer. Some of their homes are still standing, while others like Edward Spicer's have sadly been demolished – considered of no significant heritage value!

War Widows Guild SA Inc

On the corner of Hewitt Avenue and Fullarton Road is the property, Vasey House, which was purchased by the War Widows Guild.

The War Widows Guild was founded by Mrs Jessie Vasey in 1945 to give much needed support for women married to soldiers who lost their lives while serving overseas during WWII, giving them the opportunity of each other's company, and to supplement their unfair pensions through activities such as weaving and handcrafts.

Jeanie Rouse was a Foundation Member of the Guild in South Australia.

She was born Jean Scriven Blyth on the 7th of October 1910, to Daisy Scriven (nee Wight) and David Blyth at Wilkinson Road, Parkside South.

During those times midwives would have attended many home births, so this may possibly have been the situation when Daisy Blyth was giving birth to her children.

We know that Jeanie Blyth married a very adventurous groom called Maxwell (Mack) Hainsworth Rouse, originally from Port Pirie.

His father (Hainsworth Frederick Rouse) had put a call out, via the newspaper, in 1928 when Mack was 15 years of age, because his son had gone missing from their home in Brougham Place at Alberton.

The description given of Maxwell included that he was a native of South Australia, (which would rightfully be challenged these days!!!) and that he had an ‘ordinary’ nose among other items given for a description of the young man. It was apparently not unusual for young men to venture from their homes early in life – history tells us that George Hubert Wilkins and Sidney Kidman ventured off from their homes very early in life to start their amazing adventures.

He must have eventually returned, because Jeannie and Mack, he was called, were married in the Office of the Principal Registrar, Adelaide on the 17th of October 1940, approximately 13 months after WWII had started.

Jean’s new husband had already enlisted in the Australian Army in July of 1940. Although this article is Jean Rouse’s story, it is important to know something of her life being married to a soldier, who never returned.

Corporal Maxwell Rouse became a Prisoner of War within the Singapore Changi camp before being transferred to the Sandakan camp in north Borneo, where he died as a POW of the

Japanese in March of 1945. He has no known grave, but his name is commemorated in a Memorial in Malaysia.

We can now go into snippets of Jeanie's life after she married.

She and Mack are said to have had 'children' – indicating more than one child.

A record of a boy called William Charlesworth has been found – born in 1942. But no records of further children have been sighted at this time. If any relatives do come forward with information about other children, it would be appreciated.

At the time of her husband's death, Jean was living with her parents on Ettrick Street, Medindie. This attractive bungalow, in need of some TLC, has recently been demolished.

Jeanie apparently was not sitting at home fretting about the future (well, we don't really know that!!) but she was, in fact, actively involved with helping others.

Newspaper items in 1941 tell of Jeanie's involvement in the TOC H League of women helpers, and the Mothers' and Babies' Health Association.

This latter organisation had its beginnings, when another South Australian, Helen Mayo OBE co-founded the support association in 1927, because she could see the need for mothers needing assistance with their families, so the tradition of women volunteering to assist others was being carried on.

In the year of 1941, Jean Rouse, as Secretary of the Mothers and Babies Health Association, had worked in the Stow Building, Flinders Street, Adelaide.

Jean Rouse was a foundation member of the South Australian War Widows Guild and was also the first war widow in SA to pay her one shilling to become a member.

Music was a much-loved hobby of Jeanie's, as well as being one of the South Australian Guild's very early weavers. At one stage had been an instructress for a course of night classes.

She was so efficient at the craft that the Governor of SA, Sir Mark Oliphant, asked the Guild to weave a length of fabric to reupholster two small chairs in the Royal Suite of Government House, in anticipation of a visit by Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip. Jean was given the task. Sir Mark chose the pattern and colours, and S A woollen mills supplied the wool.

Jeanie would probably have seen the original stables that were on the property of Vasey House, originally the home of Richard Verco, and this was what the Guild used as a shop to store and sell their craft items.

In another news item, it was reported that Mrs Jean Rouse was installed as Chairman for 1954 of the TOC H organisations, whose activities of which helped several other support groups, including the "Women's Association". Functions organised included a camp for girls at Victor Harbor, a report on the Australian Festival held in Perth, planning a sweet stall for the Spastic Children's Fete, and various other events.

The Adelaide branch of TOC H held some of their meetings at the home of Olive Hookings, of Close Street, Rose Park – within walking distance of Vasey House in Hewitt Avenue.

In 1954, members of TOC H at that time were asked to go along to help clear up after repairs following the Adelaide earthquake – in particular Mitcham Branch of TOC H, and in the city office at Selborne Chambers, Pirie Street Adelaide.

Jeanie had returned to work when her children went to school but used time from her annual leave to be the Minutes Secretary during Janet Mayo's term of office as President of the War Widows Guild. She took the minutes of the first State Conference under Janet Mayo's leadership also in October 1967, in Adelaide.

Edith Janet Mayo was the South Australian President of the War Widows Guild at the time of Jessie Vasey's death in 1966 and was promptly elected the new National President.


She became a War Widow in 1941, at 26 years, receiving the telegram of her husband's death while he was serving on the HMAS Sydney, which was attacked by the German raider war ship called Kormoran off the coast of Western Australian with the loss of all on board.

Janet, like many war wives was living with her parents, Janet Doris (nee Hubbe) and Alfred Allen Simpson at "Undelcarra" a well-known historical house in Burnside. The telegram simply said, 'Missing in action, believed killed.'

The Janet Mayo Building – of the War Widows Guild – in Hewitt Avenue, stands on the corner of Close Street and bears her name.

With all of these women, we can clearly see that when a social problem occurred, they actively stepped up to help and be involved.

Jeanie Rouse passed away at 141 Fullarton Road in 1983, in the Heritage house that now bears her name, “*Jean Rouse Villa*”. She was aged 72 years.

This is a beautiful resting place for many people including Dr John Dowie AM, the famous sculptor and artist, who was a resident of Dulwich, which, like Rose Park, is a suburb of the City of Burnside.

The Fullarton Road Villas of the War Widows Guild – “Jean Rouse Villa” (141 Fullarton Road) and “Vasey House” (2 Hewitt Avenue)

Between 1965 and 1966, what was Victoria Avenue had its name changed to Fullarton Road. Before that, it had had several different names, initially with Kent Road, beginning where the Maid and Magpie Hotel now stands; Brownhill Creek Road; Government Road; etc.

These two houses stand side by side, one on Hewitt Avenue and the other on Fullarton Road.

Despite very important people who may have built and lived in these homes, their importance seems secondary to the story of the brave women of the War Widows Guild who have had to fight difficult battles for justice and fairness in receiving pensions and support – and who, it appears still have to keep fighting to avoid unceremonious eviction.

In 1965, number 7 Victoria Avenue, as it was the name and number used at the time (now known as 141, Fullarton Road), had Mrs E Pierson and Mrs B McLeod as residing there – most likely War Widows. The following year, 1966, the records show it as Number 141 and as simply the War Widows Guild in 1967.

This following is an extract from a letter from a young girl, coming from overseas to visit her father's parents on Grant Avenue, Rose Park, and who had read her grandmother's copy of the book "*Secrets of Rose Park, Toorak Gardens, Dulwich, and Districts Beyond*" and kindly wrote a review.

I found this Book fascinating particularly the Diagrams and Descriptions of the Houses first built there.

I wonder what life will be like in a hundred years time!

— Emilia [REDACTED] 9

The 'wisdom of youth'! Was she telling us to be careful with our heritage homes.

Unfortunately, I have been told that the records of the War Widows Guild have been kept in the original office of Vasey House, at Number 2 Hewitt Avenue, Rose Park, which has been locked and therefore not available now to any of the present residents as at the 7th of January 2026.

These ladies have applied to another interstate War Veterans Association in New South Wales to be accepted under their organisation, but after 4 months have had no reply.

After visiting two residents at Vasey House, I came away with the realisation that it seems that nothing at all has changed as far as assistance to help War Widows and as a society we should be ashamed.



Noting at 141 Fullarton, Vasey House (Local Heritage: 8278) and Jean Rouse Villa, both to the East, and the entrance to the Victoria Park “Members Gate” on the West (the Victoria Park grandstand also being a “significant” State Heritage place (ID: 13661).

These remaining buildings also provide one of the last Fullarton road entrances / gateways / corridors into the recognised “Heritage Precinct” of Rose Park (itself one of the last remaining intact precincts of its kind in greater Adelaide).

Put simply, there are three distinct layers of critical heritage importance at play with this location.

First, Jessie Vasey House, Jean Rouse Villa, and the broader legacy of the SA War Widows, which forms a unique and irreplaceable cultural asset on this site, and the state broadly.

Second, directly opposite sits Victoria Park grandstand, its historic gates, and the surrounding parklands (picture below).

Third, the suburb of Rose Park itself—one of Adelaide’s most intact heritage precincts—contains significant streetscapes, **including the State Heritage listed WWI memorial plantings along Alexandra Avenue (ID: 13987).**

The current proposed development at 141 Fullarton, would completely erase the first of these heritage layers, should Vasey House be partially demolished, and Jean Rouse Villa demolished.



In doing so, this would also diminish the value of the other two layers.

The result would also be an intrusive, visually jarring backdrop, that overwhelms and undermines the remaining heritage assets, rather than respecting and complementing them appropriately.

South Australia commemorates inaugural War Widows Day

War Widows Day will be commemorated for the first time today in South Australia to recognise the resilience and enduring sacrifice of Australian war widows.

This important day of observance is an opportunity for the South Australian community to pay tribute to the strength, courage, and unwavering commitment of those who have lost a spouse or partner through service for the Australian Defence Force.

The day of commemoration was officially declared by the Malinauskas Labor Government in March this year, following strong advocacy from the Australian War Widows (SA) Inc.

The Australian War Widows Inc. (previously the War Widows' Guild of Australia) has a long history of supporting the families of the fallen. It was established in 1945 by Mrs Jessie Vasey, whose birthday has been chosen as the commemoration date. In recognition of the occasion, Parliament House will be lit up in royal blue tonight – the official colour of Australian War Widows Inc.

War Widows Day will be formally recognised in South Australia on 19 October each year.

The inspiring story behind War Widows Day

October 19 has been officially enshrined as War Widows Day in South Australia, recognising the sacrifices and contributions of generations of war widows and widowers.

Australian war widows and widowers were formally recognised for the first time in South Australia, when the inaugural War Widows Day was held on 19 October 2023.

The day of commemoration was officially declared by the South Australian Government in March 2023, following strong advocacy from the Australian War Widows (SA) Inc and similar declarations in New South Wales and Queensland.

At the time, then Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Geoff Brock, recognised the work of Australian War Widows (SA) Inc. (now part of the Families of Veterans Guild) whose members support the wellbeing of Defence families.

"Establishing a dedicated day to recognise and honour our war widows and widowers is a simple yet significant gesture to acknowledge all who have been touched and bereaved by the death of a spouse resulting from Defence service," he said. "We also recognise the tireless work of Australian War Widows (SA) Inc as they continue to support the wellbeing of Defence families affected by a loss across the state."

Founded as the War Widows' Craft Guild by Mrs Jessie Vasey OBE CBE in November 1945, the organisation has continued to evolve to meet the needs of its ever-changing community for more than 75 years. It was established in response to a lack of support and recognition of war widows and families following World War I and World War II.

Mrs Vasey was the wife of Major General George Vasey CB CBE DSO, one of the most renowned Australian generals of the Second World War.

During a visit home in 1945, Major General Vasey visited the widow of one of his fallen men, where he was shocked by the poor conditions they were living in and the absence of government support. He decided that after peace was declared it would be his mission to fight for better compensation and support for war widows.

In a sad twist of fate, Mrs Vasey herself became a war widow when her husband was killed in an aircraft crash on 5 March 1945. It was then that she decided to follow through with her husband's pledge to ensure that war widows and their families would be cared for, just as the government had promised to the men who enlisted.

When the organisation started advocating for the national declaration of War Widows Day, 19 October – Mrs Vasey's birthdate – was chosen in her honour as the commemoration date.

In 2024, the day was marked nationally for the first time, with 19 October recognised across the country as National War Widows Day, to honour the sacrifice war widows have endured and the legacy they carry on.

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Early Activities & Fundraising of the South Australian War Widows Guild

Early Activities (1940s–1950s) & Fundraising

1. Craftwork & Handicraft Groups

From its earliest years, the SA War Widows Guild centred its work around practical craft groups. These early activities are described as:

- Teaching weaving and other handicrafts to help SA widows supplement their inadequate pensions.
- Providing a safe social environment for women adjusting to life after WWII.
- Offering a sense of shared purpose, self-help, and community rebuilding.

The presence of South Australian Guild made craft pieces—such as a 1950 woven tray cloth by SA member Mrs Joyce Mobsby, now held in the National War Memorial (below) demonstrates that these creative activities were firmly established in the SA branch. These traditions continued after the Guild established its permanent home at Rose Park.

2. Companionship, Counselling & Support

Alongside practical craftwork, the SA War Widows Guild provided essential emotional and welfare support:

- Regular social gatherings to combat isolation at the Rose Park site.
- Guidance navigating pensions, benefits, and housing entitlements.
- Advocacy for widows' rights at both state and national levels.

This social cohesion became a defining strength of the Guild's identity in South Australia.

Early Fundraising Methods

1. Sale of Handicrafts

Handicraft production served a dual purpose: therapy and fundraising.

- Members created goods such as woven cloths, embroidery, and household textiles.
- These items were sold privately, and at Guild events to raise funds and augment members' personal incomes.

These small-scale, member-driven fundraising efforts formed the financial backbone of the Guild's early years, and enabled the ladies to fund the Rose Park site purchase (following 15 years of fundraising efforts).

2. Community-Based Fundraising Events

The South Australian branch also relied on broader community engagement:

- Fairs, stalls and displays featuring Guild made goods.
- Social gatherings that raised both funds and public awareness of SA war widows' needs.
- Advocacy events that supported the Guild's growing influence.

These activities fostered goodwill and broadened the Guild's community presence.

3. Housing-Related Fundraising (Mid 1950s)

By the 1950s, the Guild's focus was shifting toward securing stable housing for widows.

- In South Australia, this facilitated the purchase of the historic homes on Fullarton Road, later forming the core of the Rose Park site.
- Housing became a national priority, and SA—already well established—played an active role in these initiatives with the purchase of the Rose Park properties.

This era marked the Guild's expansion from a social support organisation to a provider of long-term security for widows.

Historical Artifacts and Archival Records (Australian War Widows (SA) Inc.)

A substantial collection of historical artifacts—including weaving looms, tapestries, and “archival documents” remain on site at **141 Fullarton Road Rose Park (locked away)**.

Unfortunately, these materials have been inaccessible since **4 December 2025** when locks to the ladies onsite office and hall were changed by the [REDACTED].

It is our sincere hope these culturally significant items and official records will soon be released to their rightful owners, and allowed to form the foundations of a working museum onsite based on the current State Heritage Nomination.


Noting these artifacts represent a vital part of South Australia's social history, and stand as a living reminder of the extraordinary achievements of the SA War Widows—women who persevered through hardship, inequality, and disadvantage. A fact not lost on those remaining, as they fight to protect their legacy in the modern era.

Summary

The early activities and fundraising efforts of the South Australian War Widows' Guild were foundational to its long-term impact. Through craftwork, community engagement, and determined fundraising—particularly for housing—the Guild built both a strong internal community, and a stable organisational base. These early efforts ultimately enabled the establishment of the Rose Park homebase, which became a lasting centre of support and companionship for South Australian war widows as it still is today. It is unfortunately that this legacy is currently at serious risk of being lost unless the State Heritage Nomination is appropriately supported.

WAR WIDOWS' GUILD OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Ms BEDFORD (Florey) (15:55): This year marks the 75th anniversary of the establishment of the War Widows' Guild of South Australia. Many may not be aware of the history of the guild and the place it has in South Australia's and indeed Australia's military history. I am indebted to Helen Adamson for her remarks on the 70th anniversary in 2016 and, in light of the auspiciousness of this year's anniversary, feel it necessary to put some of those remarks on the record in the lead-up to this year's events.

The War Widows' Guild was formed across Australia through the leadership of Mrs Jessie Vasey. Her husband, General George A. Vasey, cared not only about his men but also about the widows and orphans of his soldiers. When he was killed in an air accident in 1946, Jessie was determined to carry on the work her husband had begun by founding the War Widows' Guild and serving as its president until her death in 1966.

The broad aims of the guild were to watch over and protect the interest of war widows. Mrs Vasey believed the surest way to help the widows maintain a dignified standard of living was by rehabilitation through the formation of craft groups. Here was a twofold purpose: sharing the company of women grappling with same issues of loss and the prospect of supplementing meagre compensatory pensions through craft works—hence, the original title of the organisation was the War Widows' Craft Guild of Australia.

In South Australia in September 1946, Mrs Jefferson Walker was contacted by Mrs Vasey to begin the guild in this state. Initially, there was some opposition to the organisation being established here but help arrived from a number of different areas, including Adelaide's then Lord Mayor, Mr Jack McClay, who made a room at the Town Hall available for guild meetings. The first meeting of the branch was subsequently held in the Lady Mayoress's room at Town Hall on 20 October 1946.

The first general meeting was held at the Women's Auxiliary National Service Headquarters on North Terrace on 8 November 1946. The guild's first office was set up at Kingsway House at 89 Flinders Street, remaining the South Australian headquarters for the next 13 years.

Help continued to come from various areas and in different forms. The South Australian branch of the Returned Sailors', Soldiers' and Airmen's Imperial League of Australia, now the RSL SA, helped sponsor a public meeting to raise awareness and John Martin & Co. Ltd held an exhibition and sale of selected handcrafts in the shop's gallery, with Wholesale Furniture Manufacturer Pty Ltd supplying furniture for the Flinders Street office.

In April 1947, the first AGM of the guild was held at the Adelaide Cheer-up Hut. This same year, the RSL SA made their music room available for monthly general meetings, which took place on the first Friday of each month. A council of up to 20 members was formed in the 1950s to organise the social side of the guild, one activity being the now famous bus trip outings held on the third Friday of each month, still being enjoyed by guild members today.

In February 1955, a small shop was acquired for the sale of members' handcrafts in the suburb of Unley. In 1957, Kingsway House was sold and the committee began looking for a more serviceable venue. As well as an office for their headquarters, they needed accommodation for some of the more elderly members of the guild. A house was found on the corner of Fullarton Road and Hewitt Avenue in Rose Park and was later named Vasey House in honour of the guild's founders. The backyard began to be used for the guild's monthly trading tables to sell handcrafted items made by guild members.

More accommodation was needed and in 1959 a two-storey structure consisting of 12 self-contained flats was built. In 1966, another building was erected with six additional flats and a very large meeting room for monthly meetings. It was named Lorna Hosking House, in honour of the guild's then president who had worked so hard and tirelessly to secure the buildings. An office and kitchen were also included and all these facilities are still in use today.

It is important we remember the wives and children of those soldiers who did not return, who are arguably left to bear the true cost of war. Seventy-five years ago, the promise of the government of the day was: 'If the husband died for their country, their widows and orphans would not want.'

The work of the War Widows' Guild has done much to alleviate the pressure of this burden and to ensure war widows are not forgotten. This work goes back to the ANZAC campaign, and each year I am happy to buy Anzac cookies from the War Widows' Guild.

Because of this care for widows and their children, it is no surprise that Legacy Club South Australia and Broken Hill is happy to welcome the war widows' participation in the annual Australasian Soldiers Dardanelles Cenotaph Commemorative Service each year. The memorial was unveiled on Wattle Day on 7 September 1915—the first such memorial after the great losses of 25 April.

Leading a green revolution in commemorative tributes

A message from Australian War Widows SA Inc. (AWWSA)



In a powerful step towards sustainability, AWWSA hosted an inspiring workshop that brought together diverse veteran and ex-service communities to rethink how tributes are made and laid at commemorative ceremonies.

The session was conducted by Shirley Lynott from The Little Flower Shop. Shirley's personal connection to the cause is deep: her mother was a war widow. Drawing on her floristry expertise, Shirley demonstrated how to source and create natural wreaths using sustainable materials such as grapevine, jute, and native Australian flowers. Attendees learned how these organic alternatives not only honour our fallen heroes with dignity, but also protect our precious

environment from harmful pollutants commonly found in traditional wreath-making materials.

Centennial Park Cemetery, renowned for its commitment to environmental stewardship, kindly provided a function space for the event. The workshop attracted participants from across the veteran community – including representatives from the War Widows, Partners of Veterans, Vietnam Veterans Federation, Veterans SA, Legacy, and the Malaya Borneo Association – highlighting broad support for this important cause. After a morning of hands-on learning and heartfelt discussion, participants enjoyed a delicious morning tea, fostering a warm sense of community and shared purpose.



Driving this movement is Diane Carr, a passionate war widow and former AWWSA President. Diane is calling for a national policy among veteran organisations to commit to fully sustainable tributes at all commemorative services. She credits her inspiration to His Majesty King Charles III, who set a profound example by ensuring that only locally sourced flowers were used both at the funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and his own coronation – symbolising respect for tradition coupled with environmental responsibility.

The event garnered formal recognition with a written endorsement from AWWSA's patron, Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, underscoring the importance of this environmental shift.

This initiative, funded by AWWSA and supported by a generous environmental grant from the Burnside Council, marked a milestone in promoting eco-friendly remembrance. A collaborative effort between veteran communities, environmental advocates, and local government, it sets a hopeful precedent and demonstrates that honouring those who

served can be done in a way that respects not only their memory, but the world they fought to protect.

When a child called Jessie Halbert was born in Roma, Queensland, in 1897 our country would have had no idea of the impact she would have on the lives of war widows and their families after the Second World War throughout Australia.

On the 126th anniversary of her birth, we remember Jessie and the loss of her husband, Major General George Allan Vasey. Jessie became a war widow on 5 March 1945 and changed the lives of other women and families who had lost their husband and father defending our country in wartime.

This year, Australian War Widows NSW (AWW-NSW) partnered with Sydney Legacy to mark War Widows Day. A service was held in the afternoon at The Cenotaph in Martin Place, Sydney. The focus was on war widows past and present, with widows holding a floral tribute of their own: one by one, they stood at The Cenotaph to lay a branch of wattle, in remembrance of each other's, and indeed their own, sacrifices and in acknowledging their priceless contribution to our nation.

Prior to this service, NSW war widows were hosted by the Governor General and Mrs Hurley at Admiralty House for morning tea, which was followed by a lunch at the Fullerton Hotel. At the service, we had the privilege to hear from the great niece of Jessie Vasey, Ms Pru Bennett, who shared the experiences of her great aunt and how and why she established the Australian War Widows organisation.

The service featured a War Widows Day address given by Afghanistan war widow Bree Till who spoke of the harsh reality of being left behind and raising a family following the passing of her husband, Brett Till. She spoke of her heartbreak when sitting with a friend on her first wedding anniversary after Brett had been killed.

In NSW, the day had traditionally been observed as Founders' Day and used to feature war widows walking through Hyde Park en masse to be seen and heard. To see it now turn into a formal day recognised by the NSW Government makes it a priority for the people of the state on that day. 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

Description

History / Summary

Woven cloth made by Mrs Erica Joyce Mobsby of Adelaide in 1950. Born in 1913 in Adelaide as Erica Joyce Tassie (but known as Joyce), she worked as a bank clerk in the Bank of NSW. Here she grew friendly with Edward Tompson Mobsby, also of Adelaide. Born in Staffordshire, England in 1910, Edward moved to Adelaide with his family in 1920 and in 1926 also joined the Bank of NSW. They married in 1936 and in April 1939 Joyce gave birth to twin girls, Rae and Jennifer.

Mobsby enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force on 6 January 1941 under service number 407799. From January 1941 until May 1942 he attended various air force training in schools in South Australia and Victoria. After gaining the rank of flying officer in February 1942, he was posted to the RAAF Headquarters North Eastern Area in Townsville in May. By the end of the month was seconded to the United States 90th Squadron, 3rd Bombardment Group, based at Charters Towers and flying North American B-25Cs.

The Americans were suffering from a shortage of aircrew and they welcomed the Australian pilot whom they nicknamed 'Mobs'. The other four crew were all Americans but flying as co-pilot, he quickly adapted to the job – Mobsby was flying his first mission just 10 days after he joined them – bombing Lae on the east coast of New Guinea on 9 June, a day after the squadron moved from Charters Towers to Seven Mile Drome at Port Moresby.

On 26 July after just a dozen or so missions, his squadron was called upon to bomb Japanese flying boats at Gasmata in New Britain – a stronghold of Japanese fighters. The five B-25Cs had not left the New Guinea mainland before they were attacked by a flight of nine Zero fighters over Gona Mission – they dropped their bombs and turned for Port Moresby. But the odds were against them, and Mobsby's Mitchell was seen

"burning fiercely from nose to tail" with Flying Officer Mobsby vainly trying to struggle though upper cockpit hatch. No one parachuted out. Another Mitchell was brought down as well. The entire crew of five were lost and the plane wasn't located.

Back in Adelaide on the same day, Joyce woke up in the middle of the night, sobbing and inconsolable. She'd had a nightmare and heard Edward calling to her that his plane had been shot down. He was posted as missing until May 1943, when his identity disc was discovered with his remains, near Kokoda. He was buried in Bomana War Cemetery. He was 31 years old.

His effects were sent to her. She settled down to life as a widowed mother of two three year old girls, returning to the bank and, after the war, helping to set up the South Australia branch of the War Widows Guild of Australia in 1946, being its treasurer and helping to raise funds by organising fetes and craft shows. She never remarried.

One of the fliers in the squadron Warrant Officer Murray Wilson, wrote to her in late 1942, saying that "he has been recommended for an American Decoration and this should soon be approved." But while the American members of the crew were posthumously awarded the Silver Star, the family of Flying Officer Edward Mobsby was forbidden to accept a foreign award. Joyce enquired about this during the war, but was always knocked back.

Joyce died in 1993, but her daughters, took up the fight and pressured the United States to award the Silver Star to Mobsby. In 2014, having written to President Barak Obama, a posthumous Silver Star was awarded to the daughters of Edward Mobsby in a ceremony at the Australian War Memorial.


This woven cloth tray cloth, woven by Joyce, was possibly part of a country tour of the display of handicrafts by guild members mentioned in Adelaide's "The Advertiser" for 5 October 1950. "The goods will include a collection of beautiful examples of hand-weaving in wool and linen at prices ranging from 4/6 to £10 10." The display was organised by Joyce; she was still active in the Guild's activities in the 1980s.


The site is located within an **exceptionally sensitive heritage context**, including:

- Vasey House (Local Heritage Place);
- Multiple State Heritage Places x 4 and Local Heritage Places x 2 within close proximity; and
- The Northwestern gateway to the Rose Park Historic Area via a heritage “bookend” entrance to Hewitt Avenue (Local Heritage places either side).



We would assert this site is one of the last remaining “concentrated clusters / triangulations” of significant heritage “typology”, abutting the East Parklands which were also inscribed on the National Heritage List on 7 November 2008.

There are already x4 State Heritage places within a 250m radius of this site + x2 Local Heritage places effectively “bookending” the entrance to Rose Park’s “intact Historical Conservation Zone Precinct” via Hewitt Avenue... This is extremely rare, and of significant historical importance to the State, and would be basically destroyed if the current proposed of “high-density” massing was allowed on this site.




STREET ELEVATION - FULLARTON RD CONTEXT

JOAN HOGBEN, AND "JOAN HOGBEN COTTAGE" CONNECTION

2A HEWITT AVE, ROSE PARK.

Number 2A Hewitt Avenue, Rose Park came to my attention during February 2026, when it appeared to be 'earmarked' for demolition within the next few months to make way for a luxury retirement village.

The house bore the name "*Joan Hogben Cottage*" and was part of the War Widows Guild of SA complex.

I knocked on the front door after seeing '2A' on a post at the gateway entrance, and noticed immediately that the description of the bungalow as a Cottage was perhaps misleading, because it looked like a gracious, homely building with a long veranda, and not what we would normally refer to as a "cottage", as appealing as that may be.




I could imagine war widows, coming from different buildings of the Vasey House War Widows complex, gathering there on the verandah for a good, much needed chatty catch-up.

No one was there that particular day, but it seemed quite stately in appearance with the quarry-stone walls seeming to speak to me and say,

'Please save Me'. So that is what I am attempting to do.

Bungalows in Adelaide and South Australia were to become very popular in the 1920s, when the climate indicated that wide house eaves and verandahs seemed the most sensible method of building home dwellings.

This is where number 2A Hewitt Avenue starts to show its uniqueness. It appears to have been built in 1929-30, when Mary Elizabeth and James Richard Blaikie moved into the bungalow. It first appears in the Sands and MacDougall Directory in 1930.



It is unique in this western end of Hewitt Avenue, being one of very few bungalows among the villas in the street.

James and Mary Blaikie purchased three allotments, where the house was built bordering on Thomas Place. Mary Elizabeth died in 1933, and James married Charlotte May Bayly in 1935. James Richard, known as Jim, died in 1951 at the age of 76 in their home.

Charlotte May was still living there at least until 1973, and if the War Widows Office had not been locked in recent years by the [REDACTED], it would be rewarding to know if there are records to show if the bungalow and the other allotments were purchased by, or gifted to, the War Widows Guild by the Blaikie family.

Architects and builders, such as Alexander Maddern, whose two-storey home at number 3 Prescott Terrace, were busy building attractive houses just around the corner along Hewitt Avenue.

The first home of Jessie Anderson, the mother of Dame Judith Anderson, still sits proudly on Hewitt Avenue, where the history of residents from the Heritage Precinct street is endless.

Coming back to what was to be named '*Joan Hogben Cottage*', now 2A Hewitt Avenue, and the reason for stepping into the garden, was its connection with the War Widows accommodation complex, along with '*Vasey House*', and number 141 Fullarton Road, named '*Jean Rouse Villa*'. Joan Hogben (nee Shepherdson) was born near Mount Gamber in February 1912, (three years after Sir Robert Helpmann, was born in the "Mount", and who also came later, with his family onto the original Prescott farmland during sub-division. Their house and others brought for the family are now named in the Toorak Gardens area, which was originally Rose Park or Monreith).

Joan married a pharmacist, Ernest Edward Hogben in 1939. He later enlisted in the Army and served in New Guinea. Like so many other soldiers fighting in appalling conditions, he was discharged as medically unfit and returned to his profession – but his health was permanently affected. He died in 1960.

As a coincidence, in 1960, just after the death of her husband, Joan called at the office of the Guild one day, to pay her subscription, and when she mentioned that she intended

to get a part-time job, the position of the Secretary for the War Widows Guild was offered to her – and she accepted. She held this position for seven years.

In the attempt to finish a never-ending story of the continued call for justice in support of our Australian War Widows, let me add a humorous quote from Jessie Vasey:-

"Have you heard the old saying, 'If you stop a-tooting of your horn, all the folks of your village will forget you were born'?"

War widows were permanently neglected between the two World Wars because they stopped 'a-tooting of their horn'. The same thing will happen again if, in particular, the Second World war widows do not bestir themselves."

Let us not neglect the remaining War Widows in South Australia!

During Janet Mayo's term as National President (which began in 1967), Joan Hogben held the position of National Secretary. It is no wonder then, that the bungalow was named in her honour. Was her spirit also standing on the verandah on that Sunday afternoon, in February 2026, giving a prompt to save this Rose Park property?

When Janet Mayo (after whom "Janet Mayo House", also in Hewitt Avenue, was named) resigned from her position as National President in 1977, Joan Hogben also resigned as National Secretary after they had served for eleven years.
