2020-21 ANNUAL REPORT for the Premier's Climate Change Council

From the Chair

I am pleased to present the 2020-21 Annual Report for the Premier's Climate Change Council of South Australia.

Here in South Australia, we have much to be proud of in terms of climate change action and response. As well as being recognised globally as a leader in renewable energy, our state continues to achieve reductions in greenhouse gas emissions and deliver economic growth.

We have made good progress towards our ambitious interim target to reduce net emissions by more than 50% by 2030 (from 2005 levels), achieving a 33 percent reduction in emissions between 2005 and 2018-19.

In 2020, the Council assisted the government to develop the *South Australian Government Climate Change Action Plan 2021- 2025,* which was released by the Marshall Government in December 2020. The Action Plan includes 68 government-led actions across seven focus areas.

I commend the government on its approach to climate change and for championing the development of the Action Plan.

In 2020-21, the Premier's Climate Change Council covered a wide range of topics including land use planning reforms, renewable energy and waste management.

I thank my fellow Council members for their expertise and commitment to providing advice on a range of climate change issues.

The renowned climate change economist, Professor Ross Garnaut highlights in his report: *South Australia's Climate Change Challenge and Opportunity* that South Australia is well equipped to respond to the challenges and opportunities of climate change. He highlights that we cannot afford to rest on our laurels.

The 6th Assessment Science Report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change further highlights that significant and faster action globally is required.

In this context, the work of the Council to advise the government and to engage with business and community on reducing greenhouse gas emissions and adapting to climate change is more important than ever.

The agency's performance

Performance at a glance

A key role of the Council is to provide advice to the Minister for Environment and Water and the South Australian government on matters relating to climate change mitigation and building resilience. The Council actively identifies and takes advantage of opportunities to ensure climate change is considered in key areas of government policy.

The Council supported the development of the *South Australian Government Climate Change Action Plan 2021-25* (Action Plan) which was released in December 2020. The Council will continue to play a key role in the implementation, monitoring and reporting of the Action Plan.

In 2020-21 the Council delivered the third round of the SA Climate Leaders Awards, which aims to recognise individuals, groups, organisations and partnerships that demonstrate collaboration, innovation and action to address climate change.

During this reporting period the Council has provided feedback and developed a number of submissions through public consultation processes, and through meetings with government officers and other government boards and councils.

The Council takes a leadership role in consulting with stakeholders about issues associated with climate change, to disseminate information and encourage climate action. This includes holding joint meetings and presenting at stakeholder forums.
