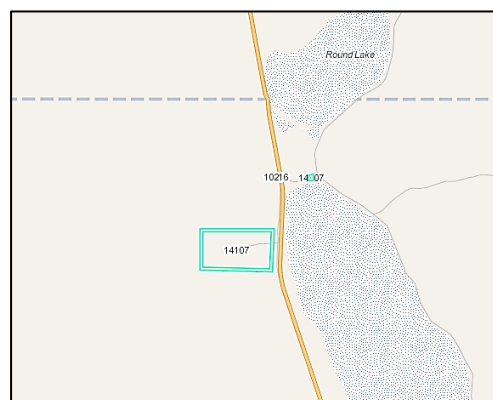

Lake Hamilton is one of the rare homesteads left intact on the Eyre Peninsula, without any unsympathetic additions or alterations and still lovingly cared for by its present owners. It was first taken up in the early 1840's as an occupational lease and known as the 'Sharinga Run' of which JF Haigh and RW Mortlock were the leaseholders. The lake was named after George Hamilton, the commissioner of police in South Australia back in 1839 when the legendary Edward John Eyre first set off north to explore the peninsula which now bears his name.
