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## The South Australian Heritage Council

### Establishment

The South Australian Heritage Council (the Council) is established under section 4 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

### Council Functions

The Council has the following functions as prescribed in section 5A of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*:

- (a) to provide advice (especially from a strategic perspective) to the Minister for Environment and Conservation on matters relating to:
  - (i) trends, shortcomings and opportunities with respect to heritage protection at the State and local level and, insofar as may be relevant, at the national level;
  - (ii) the development and effectiveness of heritage conservation programs, policies, initiatives and incentives;
  - (iii) the operation and enforcement of this Act; and
  - (iv) other issues referred to the Council by the Minister of Environment and Conservation for consideration and report;
- (b) to administer the Act including:
  - (i) maintenance of the *South Australian Heritage Register*;
  - (ii) identification of places, and related objects, of State heritage significance, and entering them in the Register;
  - (iii) identification of areas of State heritage significance, and promoting their establishment, in appropriate cases, as State Heritage Areas under the *Development Act 1993*;
  - (iv) initiating or supporting community awareness programs that promote public understanding and appreciation of the State's heritage; and
  - (v) promoting the objects of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* in such other manner as the Council determines, including through the work of other bodies or persons;
- (c) to provide advice (especially from a strategic perspective) to the Minister of Urban Development and Planning to whom the administration of the *Development Act 1993* is committed on matters relating to:
  - (i) the interpretation or application of the criteria set out in section 23(4) of that Act (and, if appropriate, the consideration of any potential amendment with respect to those criteria); and
  - (ii) other matters on which that Minister is required to consult with the Council under the provisions of that Act;

- (d) to perform any other function assigned to the Council by or under the *Heritage Places Act 1993* or any other Act.

### **Council Membership**

Council membership requirements are set out in section 5 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

The Council consists of:

- six to eight persons who, in the opinion of the Governor, have knowledge of or experience in history, archaeology, architecture, the natural sciences, heritage conservation, public administration, urban and regional planning or property development (or any combination of two or more of these fields), or some other relevant field; and
- one person with knowledge of, or experience in, heritage conservation chosen from a panel of three such persons submitted to the Minister by the Local Government Association of South Australia.

The Governor designates one member of the Council to chair meetings of the Council and may appoint a suitable person to act as a member of the Council in the absence of a member. Members are appointed for a term of office not exceeding three years, and on completion of a term of appointment are eligible for reappointment.

Before filling a vacancy in the membership of the Council (other than a vacancy to be filled by a person nominated by the Local Government Association), the Minister must, by advertisement published in a newspaper circulating throughout the State, invite interested members of the public to submit (within 14 days of the advertisement) the names of persons whom they regard as suitable candidates for the vacancy.

The three year term of the inaugural Council ended on 23 November 2008. On 18 December 2008, His Excellency the Governor appointed the current Council for a term of three years and appointed Mrs Judith Carr as Chair.

The Council met eight times during 2009/10.

### **Sub-committees of the Council**

Under Section 7A of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* the Council:

- (a) must establish the committees required by the regulations; and
- (b) may establish such other committees as the Council thinks fit, to advise or assist the Council.

### **The Register Committee**

The Register Committee is established under section 7A of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* and regulation 4 of the *Heritage Places Regulations 2005*. The Register Committee is ongoing in its functions.

The Register Committee considers the nominations for the South Australian Heritage Register on behalf of the Council. The Committee has been chaired by Dr Judith Brine AM since April 2009. During the 2009/2010 financial year, its members were:

The Committee met five times during the 2009/10 financial year. During that time five (5) places were provisionally entered in the Register. These were:

- Dwelling and Flat (Former Office/Garage) designed by Christopher Smith in the Art Deco Style for his own residence, Prospect;
- Former RAAF No 202 Radar Station (including four concrete shelters, the bases of two demolished towers and a gun pit), Victor Harbor;
- Whyalla Court House, Whyalla;
- Union Hall, University of Adelaide, Adelaide; and
- Eastwood Lodge (former Nurses Home), Glenside Hospital, Glenside.

Out of these provisional entries, the entry of the Dwelling and Flat (Former Office/Garage) designed by Christopher Smith in the Art Deco Style for his own residence, Prospect was subsequently confirmed by the Council.

### **Heritage Directions Working Group**

In the 2008-09 financial year, the Council established a short-term working group to develop recommendations for the update of the document *Heritage Directions: A Future for Built Heritage in South Australia*, for the Minister for Environment and Conservation. The members of the sub-committee included Ms Wigg, Dr Brine and Dr Staniforth and it was chaired by the Council Chair, Mrs Carr. Representatives of the Department for Environment and Heritage also attended.

This financial year, the working group forwarded its recommendations, endorsed by the Council, for the Minister's consideration. The recommendations for the refinement of the *Heritage Directions* Policy Framework align the document with South Australia's Strategic Plan and Government's response to the Planning Review.

### **Mining Heritage Working Group**

In 2008 the Council established a Mining Heritage Working Group to provide support for the National and World Heritage nominations of the Australian Cornish Mining Heritage Site (comprising the Moonta Mines and Burra State Heritage Areas). The Group was chaired by Mr Lewis Owens.

The Australian Government announced in June 2009 that the Australian Cornish Mining Heritage Site had been included in the 2009-10 Finalised Priority Assessment List for the National Heritage List. The assessment process is expected to be completed by June 2011.

The Council also nominated the Burra and Moonta Mines sites for the Australian World Heritage Tentative List in October 2008 as part of an intended Trans-National World Heritage listing, involving sites in Spain, Australia, Mexico and South Africa. This nomination is still under consideration by the Australian Government.

### **Communications Working Group**

The Communications working group was established to develop the Council's communication policy and procedures, and direct the development of the Council's web presence. The working group consisted of Mr Rob Donaldson, Chair, and Dr Christine Garnaut, member.

The Council webpages were updated in early 2010 to include background on the Council, strategic context, information on its membership and meetings, including schedule of meetings, agendas and meeting minutes.

## Maritime Heritage Working Group

In March 2010 the Council established the Maritime Heritage Working Group to advise the Council on policy matters relating to the management of maritime heritage in South Australia under the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

The group is chaired by Dr Mark Staniforth, and membership draws on both governmental and non-governmental sources to provide transparency in decision making and opportunities for community engagement.

## Administration of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*

### Administration of the South Australian Heritage Register

The South Australian Heritage Register is a list of places of heritage value to the State. A place may be State heritage listed if it meets one or more of the criteria specified in section 16 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* (refer to Appendix B - Information about the South Australian Heritage Register as at 30 June 2010).

In 2009-10 five State Heritage Places were provisionally entered in the Register. In addition six provisional entries were confirmed by the Council (refer to Appendix A for details).

There were 2 214 confirmed entries in the Register at 30 June 2010 (refer to Appendix B for details).

### South Australian Heritage Fund

Section 12(2) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* requires the Minister to seek and consider the Council's advice from a strategic perspective on the management and application of the South Australian Heritage Fund, which is administered to support the objects of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

The South Australian Heritage Fund Grants Program had funding of \$250 000 in 2009-10. A total of 74 applications for grants were received requesting over \$801 000 to assist with projects worth \$2.7 million. Funds were allocated to eight projects worth \$85 000. The remaining \$165 000 from the annual \$250 000 fund was used to payout grants not able to be completed in the 2008/09 program.

A further 24 applications from the 2009/10 grant program were assessed worthy of a grant and have been awarded a grant under the 2010/11 program.

## Heritage Agreements

Part 6 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* provides for Heritage Agreements to promote the conservation of State Heritage Places. A Heritage Agreement attaches to the land and is binding on the current owner of the land whether or not that owner was the person with whom the agreement was made. A Heritage Agreement is, to the extent specified in the Agreement, binding on the occupier of the land.

The Minister for Environment and Conservation may, after seeking and considering the advice of the Council, enter into a Heritage Agreement or, by agreement with the owner of the land to which a Heritage Agreement applies, vary or terminate an Agreement.

The Minister entered into a Heritage Agreement in relation to Dwelling ('Marble Hill') - Former Governors' Summer Residence (Ruin) on 12 September 2009. As at 30 June 2010, four other heritage agreements were in place relating to the following State Heritage Places:

- Belmont, Brougham Place, North Adelaide;
- St Vigeans Estate Garden, Laurel Road, Stirling;
- the former Bank SA, Gawler Street, Mount Barker; and
- Beechwood Garden and Conservatory, Snows Road, Stirling.

## State Heritage Areas

Under the *Heritage Places Act 1993*, the Council can recommend the creation of State Heritage Areas through the process of preparing Development Plan Amendments under the provisions of the *Development Act 1993*. No new Areas were recommended for the 2009-10 year.

## Other Matters

### Heritage Chairs and Officials of Australia and New Zealand (HCOANZ)

The February 2010 meeting of HCOANZ was held in Christchurch, New Zealand and was attended by the Council Chair, Mrs Judith Carr. The meeting raised a number of initiatives that will be considered for implementation in South Australia, including:

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- the Supporting Local Government project;
- convening of workshops to address a backlog of nominations (below); and
- assessment of impact of climate change on State Heritage Places and State Heritage Areas.

### **Assessment of unprocessed nominations**

On 19 May 2010, Council's Register Committee held a workshop to address a backlog of nominations. The workshop achieved a number of significant outcomes in identifying opportunities to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the heritage nominations and assessments process in South Australia.

The workshop identified actions in relation to each of the nominations on the backlog. In addition, the discussions highlighted policies and procedures that need to be developed to assist in ongoing management of nominations to prevent future backlogs.

### **Development of a Three-Year Strategic Plan**

The Council's Strategic Plan 2009-2011 was approved by the Minister for Environment and Conservation in October 2009. The Plan outlines Council's Key Directions and Targets for this period. Based on the approved Strategic Plan, the Council drafted Annual Work Plans for 2010 and 2011 that set out activities to be undertaken in order to achieve the Strategic Plan's Targets.

### **Forums with Stakeholders**

In July 2009, the Council held a forum with key partners to discuss the relationship between heritage and development: possible conflicts and opportunities. The then Minister for Environment and Conservation, Hon Jay Weatherill MP attended the Forum and the following themes were discussed:

1. How can heritage be given a higher profile with those involved with the administration and management of development?
2. How can we promote the positive contribution of heritage to the economy, and how can heritage be used to give greater value to developments?
3. How can key stakeholders preserve and promote heritage values?

The forum fostered productive relationship between the Council and its key partners, and identified a number of ideas and issues.

### Red tape reduction project

Council members Mr Michael O'Connell and Mr Gavin Leydon participated in a Steering Committee that provided policy advice to the Department for Environment and Heritage on initiatives to reduce red tape associated with the referral of heritage related Development Applications. The project identified initiatives for further consideration to reduce the number of referrals and timeframe for referrals.

### Heritage Heroes Awards 2009

Heritage Heroes is Council's annual initiative to acknowledge and promote the role of volunteers in caring for our heritage. The initiative was in partnership with the Department for Environment and Heritage and UniSA's Hawke Centre.

The inaugural Heritage Heroes Award ceremony was held in August 2009 when Hon Jay Weatherill MP, then Minister for Environment and Conservation, presented three group and three individual awards and one Minister's commendation.

### Submission on the draft Plan for Greater Adelaide

The Council made a written submission on the draft Plan for Greater Adelaide in September 2010. The Council supported the balance outlined in the draft when it wrote that 'The main aim of the Plan is to outline how the South Australian Government proposes to balance population and economic growth with the need to preserve the environment and protect the heritage, history and character of Greater Adelaide'.

### Resources

The Council has identified that resourcing is an issue to the protection, conservation and maintenance of our State heritage. In its review of Heritage Directions 2003, the Council identified the need for continuing commitment of human and financial resourcing by governments, community and industry to heritage. The Council believes that the current application of resources is insufficient to maintain our State's heritage for the longer term.



## **Council Remuneration**

The costs associated with the administration of the Council are met from the resources of DEH. Members of the Council are paid in accordance with the recommendations of the Chief Executive, Department of the Premier and Cabinet.

As from 20 November 2008, Council and Register Committee members received the following remuneration:

### **Council**

Chair: \$258 per four-hour session (note that the current Chair is a public servant and does not receive remuneration)

Member: \$206 per four-hour session.

### **Register Committee**

Chair: \$221 per four-hour session.

Member: \$177 per four-hour session.

Expenditure incurred during the period of operation for sitting fees for the Council and the Register Committee in 2009-10 is \$17 773.

## **Financial Performance**

The Council is not a corporate entity and has no funds. All financial reporting for the Council is contained in the Department for Environment and Heritage Annual Report 2009-10.

However, the Council provides strategic advice to the Minister on the management and application of money from the South Australian Heritage Fund (the Fund).

Section 11 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* states that:

- (1) The Minister for Environment and Conservation must cause proper accounts to be kept of the receipts and payments from the Fund.
- (2) The Auditor-General may at any time, and must at least once in each year, audit the accounts of the Fund.

Audited financial statements of the Fund can be viewed in the Department for Environment and Heritage Annual Report 2009-10.

## **Account Payment Performance**

Department for Environment and Heritage provides administrative resources for processing account payments for the Council and reporting on this matter is contained in its Annual Report 2009-10.

## **Contractual Agreements**

The Council did not enter into any contractual arrangements exceeding \$4 million in value during the reporting period.



## **Use of Consultants**

The Council did not engage any consultants during the reporting period.

## **Human Resources**

The Council has no employees and utilises the services of the Department for Environment and Heritage. During 2009-2010, Ms Zeljka Danilovic provided Executive Officer services to the Council. In addition there are a number of staff who contribute directly to Council's functions and the administration of the South Australian *Heritage Places Act 1993*. These include:

- Senior Register Clerk,
- Register Clerk,
- Principal Heritage Officer/Team Leader, Policy and Assessment, and
- three staff (1 full time and two part time) who undertake research and assessment of nominations to the South Australian Heritage Register.

## **Overseas travel**

The Council Chair, Mrs Judith Carr, travelled to New Zealand in February 2010 for the Heritage Chairs and Officials of Australia and New Zealand meeting.

## **Fraud**

It is declared that there were no instances of fraud detected in the activities undertaken by the Council. Strategies to detect instances of fraud are reported in the Department for Environment and Heritage Annual Report 2009-10.

## **Contribution to Government Plans, Programs**

### **Disability Action Plans**

The Council is supported by the facilities and services of the Department for Environment and Heritage. The members of the Council are aware of and abide by their obligations under the Commonwealth *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the State *Equal Opportunity Act 1984*. Reporting on this matter is contained in the Department for Environment and Heritage Annual Report 2009-10.

### **Equal Opportunity Programs**

## **Appendix B – South Australian Heritage Register as at 30 June 2010**

Section 14 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* requires that the Register will contain a description or notes with respect to:

- (a) any place entered (either as a provisional or confirmed entry) in the Register under Part 4; and
- (b) any place taken to be entered in the Register under Schedule 1 (as enacted on the commencement of this Act); and
- (c) any local heritage place designated by a Development Plan; and
- (d) any State Heritage Area; and
- (e) any local heritage zone or local heritage policy area established by a Development Plan; and
- (f) any place within the State—
  - (i) entered in any register of places of natural or historic significance; or
  - (ii) declared to be a *World Heritage Property*,  
under a law of the Commonwealth; and
- (g) any heritage agreement; and
- (h) any other matter prescribed by the regulations.

The Register is maintained on a computerised database and printouts are available for public inspection at the Department for Environment and Heritage during normal office hours. Copies of relevant entries are also routinely provided to local councils.

With respect to provision (a) above, a place must satisfy one or more of the following criteria, which are set out at section 16 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*:

- (a) It demonstrates important aspects of the evolution or pattern of the State's history; or
- (b) It has rare, uncommon or endangered qualities that are of cultural significance; or
- (c) It may yield information that will contribute to an understanding of the State's history, including its natural history; or
- (d) It is an outstanding representative of a particular class of places of cultural significance; or
- (e) It demonstrates a high degree of creative, aesthetic or technical accomplishment or is an outstanding representative of particular construction techniques or design characteristics; or
- (f) It has strong cultural or spiritual associations for the community or a group within it; or
- (g) It has a special association with the life or work of a person or organisation or an event of historical importance.

During the year five places were provisionally entered in the Register and six provisionally entered places confirmed making 2 214 confirmed State Heritage Places entered in the Register as at 30 June 2010.

## Appendix C – The South Australian Heritage Fund 2009 - 2010

The South Australian Heritage Fund (the Fund) exists for the purpose of providing funds in the furtherance of the objects of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* (the Act).

In accordance with the Act, the South Australian Heritage Council (the Council) provides strategic advice to the Minister for Environment and Conservation (the Minister) in relation to the management and application of the Fund.

As specified in section 10 of the Act, the Fund consists of any monies:

- appropriated by Parliament for the purposes of the Fund;
- provided by the Commonwealth Government;
- received by the Council by way of fees, gift, bequest or in any other way;
- received by the Minister for the purposes of the Act by way of gift, bequest or in any other way;
- any income derived from investment of the Fund; and
- any other money that is required or authorised by or under this Act to be paid into the Fund.

The Fund meets the accounting criteria of a controlled entity and is accounted for in the Department for Environment and Heritage's Financial Statements and Annual Report.

The following projects to conserve State Heritage Places were granted funding from the Fund in 2009/2010 in addition to \$165 000 provided to the 2008/09 grantees who did not finish their projects in that year.
