Plans and Objectives

Recognising the strategic context within which it operates, the South Australian Heritage Council (Council) is committed to promoting actions and activities that contribute to achievement of the following objectives and targets in South Australia's Strategic Plan.

The Council's Strategic Plan 2012-15, as approved by the Minister for Sustainability, Environment and Conservation (the Minister), sets out Council's strategic directions for its three year term. Key Directions in the Strategic Plan are intended to support the fulfilment and enhancement of the Council's functions under the *Heritage Places Act 1993* (the Act).

Operations and Initiatives

South Australian Heritage Register – State Heritage Places

A place may be entered in the South Australian Heritage Register (the Register) as a State Heritage Place if it meets one or more of the criteria specified in section 16 of the Act. The Register contains a description or notes with respect to places of heritage value to the State.

In 2012-13, **8** State Heritage Places were provisionally entered in the Register. In addition **18** provisionally entered State Heritage Places were confirmed by the Council and **2** were removed at the direction of the Minister under section 18(7) of the Act (refer to Appendix A for details).

There were **2,252** confirmed entries in the Register at 30 June 2013 (refer to Appendix B for summary tables of State Heritage Places by Local Government Areas).



Arkaroola was confirmed as a State Heritage Place in the SA Heritage Register on the 27 July 2012.

South Australian Heritage Register – State Heritage Areas

Under the Act, the Council can recommend the creation of State Heritage Areas through the process of preparing Development Plan Amendments under the provisions of the *Development Act 1993*. No new areas were recommended for the 2012-13 reporting period (Appendix B contains a list of State Heritage Areas).

South Australian Heritage Fund

The South Australian Heritage Fund is established under section 10 of the Act, and money from the fund is applied to further the objects of the Act as specified in section 12.

As specified in section 10 of the Act, the Fund consists of any monies:

- appropriated by Parliament for the purposes of the Fund;
- provided by the Government of the Commonwealth;
- received by the Council by way of fees, gift, bequest or in any other way;

- received by the Minister for the purposes of the Act by way of gift, bequest or in any other way;
- any income derived from investment of the Fund; and
- any other money that is required or authorised by or under this Act to be paid into the Fund.

The Fund meets the accounting criteria of a controlled entity and is accounted for in the Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources Financial Statements and Annual Report.

The Fund contained \$251 000 during 2012-13 and was used to implement the Heritage Grants Programme. Through the Heritage Grants Programme, owners of State Heritage Places and property owners within State Heritage Areas can apply for small grants to assist with the management and care of their properties. Following assessment of grant applications, funds were allocated to 32 projects. During the course of the grant period three grantees withdrew and two 'standby' applications were selected as replacement grant projects. All 31 grants were acquitted within the financial year (refer to Appendix C for details).

Heritage Agreements

Part 6 of the Act provides for Heritage Agreements to promote the conservation of State Heritage Places. A Heritage Agreement attaches to the land and is binding on the current owner of the land whether or not that owner was the person with whom the agreement was made. A Heritage Agreement is, to the extent specified in the agreement, binding on the occupier of the land. The Minister may, after seeking and considering the advice of the Council, enter into a Heritage Agreement or, by agreement with the owner of the land to which a Heritage Agreement applies, vary or terminate an agreement.

During the 2012–13 year the Council provided advice to the Minister on the following Heritage Agreement:

• Former John Knox Church and Former John Knox School, William Street, Morphett Vale.

As at 30 June 2013, seven Heritage Agreements were in place relating to the following State Heritage Places:

- Dwelling ('Marble Hill') Former Governors' Summer Residence (Ruin);
- Belmont, Brougham Place, North Adelaide;
- St Vigeans Estate Garden, Laurel Road, Stirling;
- Former Bank SA, Gawler Street, Mount Barker;
- Former John Knox Church and Former John Knox School, William Street, Morphett Vale;
- Beechwood Garden and Conservatory, Snows Road, Stirling; and
- Three Row Cottages and Associated Structures, 34, 36 & 38 Finniss Street, Gawler.

Heritage Directions

First prepared in 2003, *Heritage Directions* was updated in 2012 to strengthen its alignment with South Australia's Strategic Plan and to incorporate key policy directions associated with the 30-Year Plan for Greater Adelaide.

Heritage Directions 2012 explores a number of themes - reflecting an evolution in community thinking about heritage issues. It sets priorities for conserving and celebrating our past and achieving the Government's vision for creating vibrant cities, healthy neighbourhoods and safe communities.

Heritage Directions 2012 includes six (6) broad directions. These directions are:

- A legislative and policy framework to support better management of heritage
- Fostering partnerships with others
- Government leadership for heritage
- Education and training of the community and industry in heritage
- Appreciation, celebration and promotion of this State's unique cultural heritage
- Sustainability and adaptive reuse of our heritage places to ensure they remain in use for future generations.

Heritage Directions 2012 describes a future where heritage values are widely understood in the community and where heritage places are recognised for their contribution to the lifestyle, economy and identity of our State. It outlines where we need to be in five (5) to ten (10) years.

Strategic Plan

The Council's Strategic Plan 2012-15, endorsed by the Minister in May 2012, is being implemented. A review of the Plan will be conducted in 2013-14 to assess progress to inform the Council's Work Plan.

Heritage Heroes 2013

The Heritage Heroes Awards acknowledge the efforts of groups and individuals who have made a significant contribution to recognising, celebrating and conserving South Australia's heritage. The Minister presented the 2013 Heritage Heroes Awards on Tuesday 21 May 2013.

In the Group category, the Minister's Award was presented to the Farina Restoration Project Group. In the Individual category, the Minister's Award was presented to Lorraine Pomery, from the Port Elliot Branch of the National Trust of South Australia.

The Minister also presented seven Minister's Commendations and twelve Certificates of Recognition in both the Group and Individual categories. He also presented a Minister's Commendation in the Group (Youth) category to the Pichi Richi Trade Training Centre.

Heritage Chairs and Officials of Australia and New Zealand (HCOANZ)

HCOANZ provides an opportunity for Chairs to share progress, issues and initiatives across jurisdictions and to identify emerging issues. The annual meeting was held in Canberra in February 2013.

Key issues addressed at the HCOANZ meeting included:

• progress of World Heritage nominations in the Pacific Islands;

- completion of the HCOANZ Sustainability and Heritage Commercial Buildings project and the final report;
- activities planned by each jurisdiction as part of Australian Heritage Week, held from 13 April to 21 April 2013;
- completion of the Heritage Trades Skills Report developed through a joint research project with the Construction and Property Services Industry Skills Council;
- an update on the progress of the Australian Heritage Strategy being developed by the Australian Heritage Council ; and
- a proposal for the development of a National Toolkit of heritage related guidelines and documents that might assist jurisdictions.

Role, Legislation and Structure

The Council is established under section 4 of the Act. It met for eight general meetings and three special meetings during the 2012-13 year.

Objects of the Act

The Act has the following objects as prescribed under section 2.

- (a) to recognise the importance of South Australia's heritage places and related objects in understanding the course of the State's history, including its natural history; and
- (b) to provide for the identification and documentation of places and related objects of State heritage significance; and
- (c) to provide for and promote the conservation of places and related objects of State heritage significance; and
- (d) to promote an understanding and appreciation of the State's heritage; and
- (e) to encourage the sustainable use and adaptation of heritage places in a manner consistent with high standards of conservation practice, the retention of their heritage significance, and relevant development policies.

Functions of the South Australian Heritage Council

The Council has the following functions as prescribed in section 5A of the Act.

- (a) to provide advice (especially from a strategic perspective) to the Minister for Sustainability, Environment and Conservation on matters relating to:
 - (i) trends, shortcomings and opportunities with respect to heritage protection at the State and local level and, insofar as may be relevant, at the national level;
 - (ii) the development and effectiveness of heritage conservation programs, policies, initiatives and incentives;

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- (iii) the operation and enforcement of this Act; and
- (iv) other issues referred to the Council by the Minister of Environment and Conservation for consideration and report;
- (b) to administer the Act including:
 - (i) maintenance of the South Australian Heritage Register,
 - (ii) identification of places, and related objects, of State heritage significance, and entering them in the Register;
 - (iii) identification of areas of State heritage significance, and promoting their establishment, in appropriate cases, as State Heritage Areas under the *Development Act 1993*;
 - (iv) initiating or supporting community awareness programs that promote public understanding and appreciation of the State's heritage; and
 - (v) promoting the objects of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* in such other manner as the Council determines, including through the work of other bodies or persons;
- (c) to provide advice (especially from a strategic perspective) to the Minister for Urban Development, Planning and the City of Adelaide to whom the administration of the Development Act 1993 is committed on matters relating to:
 - the interpretation or application of the criteria set out in section 23(4) of that Act (and, if appropriate, the consideration of any potential amendment with respect to those criteria); and
 - (ii) other matters on which that Minister is required to consult with the Council under the provisions of that Act;
- (d) to perform any other function assigned to the Council by or under the *Heritage Places Act 1993* or any other Act.

Membership

Council membership requirements are set out in section 5 of the Act. The Council consists of:

- six to eight persons who, in the opinion of the Governor, have knowledge of or experience in history, archaeology, architecture, the natural sciences, heritage conservation, public administration, urban and regional planning or property development (or any combination of two or more of these fields), or some other relevant field; and
- one person with knowledge of, or experience in, heritage conservation chosen from a panel of three such persons submitted to the Minister by the Local Government Association of South Australia (LGA).

The Governor designates one member of the Council to chair meetings of the Council and may appoint a suitable person to act as a member of the Council in the absence of a member.

Members are appointed for a term of office not exceeding three years, and on completion of a term of appointment are eligible for reappointment.

Before filling a vacancy in the membership of the Council (other than a vacancy to be filled by a person nominated by the LGA), the Minister must, by advertisement published in a newspaper circulating throughout the State, invite interested members of the public to submit (within 14 days of the advertisement) the names of persons whom they regard as suitable candidates for the vacancy.

On 2 February 2012, His Excellency the Governor appointed the Council for a term of three years and appointed Mrs Judith Carr as Chair. The current Council consists of:

Under Section 7A of the Act the Council:

- (a) must establish the committees required by the regulations; and
- (b) may establish such other committees as the Council thinks fit, to advise or assist the Council.

The Register Committee

The Register Committee met four times during the 2012–13 year, including one joint meeting with the Council.

The Register Committee is established under section 7A of the Act and regulation 4 of the *Heritage Places Regulations 2005.* The role of the Committee is to advise and assist the Council to administer the South Australian Heritage Register by:

- identifying places, and related objects, of State heritage significance, and provisionally entering them in the Register;
- designating State Heritage Places as places of archaeological, geological, palaeontological or speleological significance pursuant to section 14(7) of the Act;
- identifying areas of State heritage significance, and where appropriate promoting their establishment as State Heritage Areas under the Development Act 1993; and

• acting on behalf of the Council with regard to any power or function delegated to the committee under section 8(1)(b) of the Act.

The two year term of the committee ended on 16 March 2012. Following a public nomination process, on 9 March 2012 the Council appointed the following members to its Register Committee for a term of two years:

Mining Heritage Working Group

In 2008 the Council established a Mining Heritage Working Group to provide support for the National and World Heritage nominations of the Australian Cornish Mining Heritage Site (comprising the Moonta Mines and Burra State Heritage Areas). The Group is chaired by Mr Michael O'Connell.

The Australian Heritage Council has yet to complete its assessment of this nomination. In light of this situation the Group did not to meet in 2012 – 2013.

Maritime Heritage Working Group

The Council's Maritime Heritage Working Group was chaired by Associate Professor Mark Staniforth until 17 December 2011. Dr Jennifer McKinnon was appointed as Chair by Council on 9 March 2012. The Working Group advises the Council on policy matters relating to the management of maritime heritage in the administration of the Heritage Places Act 1993.

The group met once during 2012-13 with Dr McKinnon as Chair. Two members, Brian Hemming from DPTI and Sgt Bob Macdonald from SAPOL, resigned due to retirement from their roles in their respective organisations. No alternates were identified. Mr Kevin Jones nominated his colleague Ms Lyndl Lawton from the SA Maritime Museum to take his place on the group. In February 2013, Dr. McKinnon resigned from the SA Heritage Council, and Mr Michael O'Connell was appointed as the Chair of the group. No further meetings have been held.

Criteria Working Group

In 2011 Council established the Criteria for State Heritage Areas Working Group chaired by Ms Carolyn Wigg, to advise it on policy matters relating to the identification of areas of State heritage significance, and to promote their establishment, in appropriate cases, as State Heritage Areas under the *Development Act 1993*.

In March 2012 the Group's terms of reference were reviewed and expanded to develop guidelines for the application of section 16 criteria for State Heritage Places and to develop a pamphlet for the community on the application of section 16 criteria and became the Criteria Working Group. The Group met twice during 2012-13.

Policy and Governance Committee

The Policy and Governance Committee chaired by Mr Gavin Leydon, was established in 2011 to provide advice to Council on all matters relating to policy and governance. The Committee provides advice and makes recommendations on policies, procedures and guidelines related to Council's roles and responsibilities under the Act. During 2012-13 the Committee met once and developed one policy, three guidelines and recommended amendments to three existing guidelines.

Meetings - General and Special

A total of eight general Council meetings were held during the 2012-13 year. A total of three special Council meeting were held during the year.

Governance Arrangements

Council's Instrument of Delegation is updated annually. In June 2012 the Council gave the Deputy Chair the same delegations as the Chair under section 8 of the Act. In matters when the Chair has a potential, perceived or actual conflict of interest, or in the absence of the Chair, the Deputy Chair is able to act on behalf of the Council.

Management of Human Resources

Financial performance

The Council is not a corporate entity and has no funds. All financial reporting for the Council is contained in the Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources Annual Report 2012–13.

The Council provides strategic advice to the Minister on the management and application of money from the South Australian Heritage Fund (the Fund).

Section 11 of the Heritage Places Act 1993 states that:

- (1) The Minister for Sustainability, Environment and Conservation must cause proper accounts to be kept of the receipts and payments from the Fund.
- (2) The Auditor-General may at any time, and must at least once in each year, audit the accounts of the Fund.

Audited financial statements of the Fund can be viewed in the Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources Annual Report 2012-13.

Contractual Arrangements

The Council did not enter into any contractual arrangements exceeding \$4 million in value during the reporting period.

The Council did not engage any consultants during the reporting period.

In relation to local heritage places, 36 local councils have lists of places of local heritage value authorised or under interim operation in their Development Plans. The City of Adelaide list existed under separate legislation prior to the passage of the *Development Act 1993* and was given equivalent status under the new Act.
