MINUTES

The 120th Meeting of the South Australian Heritage Council (the Council) was held on Thursday 5 August 2021.

Statement of Acknowledgement

The Chairperson acknowledged that this land that the Council members meet on today is the traditional lands for Kurna people and that the Council respect their spiritual relationship with their country. The Chairperson also acknowledged the Kurna people as the custodians of the Adelaide region and that their cultural and heritage beliefs are still as important to the living Kurna people today. Mr Rob Donaldson acknowledged he was meeting remotely on the traditional lands of the Barngala people.

1. WELCOME AND APOLOGIES

Mr Conlon welcomed all to the 120th meeting of the South Australian Heritage Council (the Council).

There was an apology from Mrs Peggy Brock AM.

2. ADOPTION OF AGENDA AND DECLARATION OF CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

Agenda

The agenda was adopted without amendment.

Declarations of conflict of interest

Mr Schrapel declared he had a conflict of interest in relation to the items associated with the West End Brewery as his brother works for Lion (the owner). Mr Schrapel indicated he would not participate in these matters and depart the meeting.

Mrs Lindsay declared she had a conflict of interest in relation to the items associated with the West End Brewery as her firm, DASH Architects has been engaged by Lion (the owner). Mrs Lindsay indicated she would not participate in these matters and depart the meeting.

Mr Gavin Leydon declared a conflict of interest in relation to Item 7.3 (Rosetta Head Well & Whaling Station Site) on the basis that the City of Victor Harbor have made submissions as to the extent of the proposed site listing. While Mr Leydon has had no involvement in this for the City of Victor Harbor, they are a retainer client of his firm for the provision of legal services. On that basis alone, it may be perceived he has a conflict so he will not participate in the discussion or decision-making.

3 PREVIOUS MEETING MINUTES

Council considered the minutes of the 24 June 2021 meeting of Council and approved them with two minor amendments:

- Capitalise the word 'Honours' under the 'Welcome and Apologies' section.
- Add the word 'Conservation' to text re Heritage planning under the 'Marketing and Communication' section.

RESOLUTION:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Approved** the minutes of the 24 June 2021 meeting with amendments described above.

4. ACTION ITEMS

Mrs Anna Pope, A/Manager, Heritage SA talked to Council about the progress being made against specific actions.

Council noted the following:

- Heritage SA to follow up with Crown Solicitor's Office regarding timing of advice regarding amendment of the SA Heritage Register pertaining to listings made under previous heritage legislation.
- Ms McDougall and Dr Bird will meet in the following week to discuss 20th Century architecture priorities for assessment.
- Any final comment on the draft Archaeological Guidelines to be provided to Mr. Rick Bullers, Heritage SA by close of business 6th August.
- Agreed that discussion on the status of nominations will be included in agenda for September 2021 meeting.
- Noted that Heritage SA will brief Council early in 2022 on possible places to be assessed above and beyond the public nomination process.
- Agreed that a meeting with the SA Planning Commission and or PLUS ought to be organised in the near future.

RESOLUTION

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Noted** the status of the action list.

5 FOR DISCUSSION / DECISION

5.1 SA Heritage Council Communication document 2020/2021

It was noted that a draft public communications document telling the story of the Council's work for 2020-21 has been prepared for the Council's consideration and approval. Other government boards and councils are producing similar documents to tell the story of their year's work outside of the formal annual reporting progress.

Mrs Deborah Lindsay indicated she had some minor suggested changes and that these can be emailed to Mr Hanna directly. Council endorsed the document subject to Mr Hanna working through these changes and providing to the Chairperson for approval.

Council agreed to provide the document to the Minister upon completion, and noted it will be put on Council's webpage.

Action: Mrs Deborah Lindsay to provide some minor changes via email to Mr Hanna.

Council indicated it was keen for the document to be sent to a range of key stakeholders.

Action: Council requested a stakeholder list be prepared for its consideration. Mr Hanna to circulate a draft for comment.

RESOLUTIONS

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Considered** and **approved** the 2020-21 South Australian Heritage Council Communications document subject to minor changes out of session.
- **Noted** that any changes requested will be made out of session and, with endorsement of the Chair, the document will be published on the Council's web page.
- **Approved** provision of the final communications document to the Minister for Environment and Water, CE of DEW as an attachment to its Communique, following the Council's 5 August 2021 meeting.

5.2 SA Heritage Council Annual Report 2020/2021

The South Australian Heritage Council is required to prepare an annual report on its operations at the end of each financial year for the Minister to table in the Parliament of South Australia.

The Department of Premier and Cabinet (DPC) Circular *PC013 Annual Reporting Requirements* sets out the requirements for annual reporting. The South Australian Heritage Council Annual Report for 2020-21 has been prepared using the DPC template.

The Council approved the report without amendment.

RESOLUTIONS

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Approved** the South Australian Heritage Council Annual Report 2020-21; and
- **Noted** that the Council's Annual Report will be signed by the Chair and submitted to the Minister for Environment and Water.

6. ITEMS UNDER CONSIDERATION FOR PROVISIONAL ENTRY IN THE SA HERITAGE REGISTER

6.1 Former Prospect Air Raid Precautions Sub-Control Station

Mr Chris Burns, Assessment Officer was welcomed to the meeting.

On 2 September 2019, a member of the public nominated the former Prospect ARP Sub-Control Station, 4/1 Menzies Crescent, Prospect, for listing as a State Heritage Place in the South Australian Heritage Register, as they believed it met all seven s16 criteria in the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

An Assessment Report for the former Prospect ARP Sub-Control Station was prepared and found that the place meets criteria (a), (b) and (d) under s16 of the Act. A Summary of State Heritage Place and the Assessment Report was provided to assist the Council in determining whether or not the former Prospect ARP Sub-Control Station should be provisionally entered in the Register.

Mr Burns noted an error with the number attributed to the Certificate of Title as presented in the Council's paperwork, and noted that this would be amended.

The Chairperson introduced each of the seven criteria under section 16 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*, in turn, and Council discussed whether this places meets them.

The Council agreed with the recommendation from the department that this place meets criteria (a), (b) and (d).

Council agreed the exterior of this place is intact and is an outstanding representative of this class of place.

On discussion of the Summary of State Heritage Place document:

- the Council agreed to delete the last paragraph under criterion (a).
- Noted that there were seven suburban bunkers and not eight, and this would be changed in the document.
- On page 13, change to seven bunkers.
- On page 20, 2nd line, insert text to say the baffle wall is required.
- Noted that it does qualify as an air raid shelter, even though it was not a public one.
- Move the second paragraph from criterion (b) to criterion (a).

Approved the Summary of State Heritage Place subject to the above.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

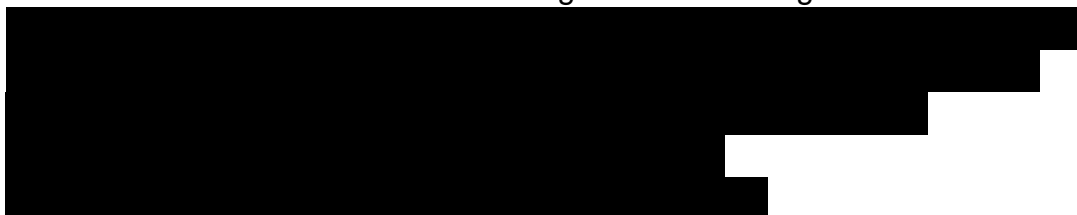
- **Provisionally entered** the Former Prospect Arp Sub-Control Station, 4/1 Menzies Crescent, Prospect (CT 5204/868 D35462 A1; CT 5737/318 F109765 A100, Hundred of Yatala) in the South Australian Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place, as it is deemed to fulfil criteria (a), (b) and (d) for State heritage listing under section 16(1) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

Criterion a) it demonstrates important aspects of the evolution or pattern of the State's history.

Criterion b) it has rare, uncommon or endangered qualities that are of cultural significance.

Criterion d) it is an outstanding representative of a particular class of places of cultural significance.

- **Approved** the Summary of State Heritage Place for the Former Prospect ARP Sub-Control Station, 4/1 Menzies Crescent, Prospect, subject to the above comments.
- **Agreed to add** the following 6 places to the 20th Century Assessment List for future assessment and consideration for listing as State Heritage Places:



6.2 Former West End Brewery Garden (former SABCo Brewery Garden), Thebarton

It was noted that Mr Stephen Schrapel and Mrs Deborah Lindsay departed the meeting at this point.

Dr Louise Bird was welcomed to the meeting.

On 27 November 2020, a member of the public nominated the West End Brewery, which is an approximately 8-hectare site fronting Port Road, Thebarton, for consideration for State Heritage Listing in the South Australian Heritage Register. The nomination identified a number of buildings/structures and suggested that due to the diversity of buildings/structures, the site as a whole meets all seven s16 criteria in the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

On 20 May 2021, the Council considered assessment reports for 'Thebarton Hall', the West End Brewery, and Copper Kettle on the understanding that separate assessment reports would be presented for consideration for the AESCo Transformer (Holland Street), Brewery Gardens and Plaque 'Thebarton Cottage' at the 5 August 2021 meeting.

A heritage assessment of the Former West End Brewery Garden recommends that it meets criteria (f) and (g) under s16 of the Act for listing as a State Heritage Place in the Register. A Summary of State Heritage Place, an Assessment Report and the nomination were provided for the Council's consideration.

Council discussed the criteria at length and determined that it only meets criterion (g) and on that basis, it will be provisionally entered as a State Heritage Place.

The discussion included the following matters:

- The heritage of the Riverbank Christmas display and that of the Garden itself.
- The role of South Australian Brewing Company (SABCO) in wanting to establish the garden to give something back to the community.
- Maintenance of the garden in its current manicured state.
- Noting that any work that will materially impact on the heritage value of the listings will require a development application (if listing proceeds).
- Discussed the evidence of Christmas activities outside of the November to 31 December period.
- The value that the community of South Australia place on the gardens and also the Christmas display.
- The philanthropy of SABCO in forming the gardens and Christmas display.
- Noted that the permanent Christmas display models are not important elements of heritage significance, though the model truck was singled out as one that is significant.

The Chairperson led the discussion on criterion (f). A clear majority of Council supported the motion that this place does not meet the threshold to be listed under criterion (f) – strong cultural or spiritual associations for the community or a group within it.

The Chairperson sought an indication from Council on whether this place meets criteria (g). Following a discussion and a vote, the Council agreed, four votes to three, that it met criterion (g).

It was noted that the draft Summary of State Heritage Place document would be updated out of session to remove criterion (f) and to amend the elements of significance by removing the models.

Action: Dr Bird to update the draft Summary of State Heritage Place document and circulate to Council via email out of session for endorsement.

- **Provisionally entered** the Former West End Brewery Garden (Former Sabco Brewery Garden), 107 Port Road, Thebarton (CT 5941/298 D64225 A2, CT 5138/158 D1038 A387, CT 5137/205 D1038 A383, CT 5138/158 D1038 A391, CT 5138/158 D1038 A386, CT 6064/474 D1038 A382, CT 5138/158 D1038 A390, CT 6137/685 F103751 A2, CT 6064/474 D1038 A381, CT 5138/158 D1038 A389, CT 6137/684 D1038 A385, CT 6064/472 D82670 A31, CT 5138/158 D1038 A388, CT 6137/684 D1038 A384, Hundred of Adelaide) in the South Australian Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place, as it is deemed to fulfil criterion (g) for State heritage listing under section 16(1) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

Criterion (g) it has a special association with the life or work of a person or organisation or an event of historical importance.

- **Approve**, in principle with appropriate changes to be made out of session, the Summary of State Heritage Place for the Former West End Brewery Garden (Former Sabco Brewery Garden), 107 Port Road, Thebarton.

6.3 Adelaide Electric Supply Company (AESCo) Transformer, Holland Street, Thebarton

An Assessment Report was prepared for the Council's consideration. It recommended that the place did not meet any of the s16 criteria for listing as a State Heritage Place. The original nomination was provided.

Council discussed the report and agreed that it did not meet any of the criteria for State Listing and rejected it.

Council agreed to add two more places to the assessment list as described in the resolutions below.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Considered** the Assessment Report for the AESCo Transformer (Holland Street), 107 Port Road, Thebarton 5031
- **Rejected** the AESCo Transformer (Holland Street), 107 Port Road, Thebarton 5031 (CT 5941/298 D64225 A2 Hundred of Adelaide) as it does not meet any of the s16 criteria in the *Heritage Places Act 1993* for listing as a State Heritage Place.
- **Added** Kelvin House, North Terrace (former AESCo office) to the 20th Century Architecture Assessment List for future assessment and consideration for listing as a State Heritage Place.
- **Added** the JC Stobie tribute at Angle Park Stobie Pole manufacturing premises to the 20th Century Assessment List for further investigation to ascertain if the tribute should be assessed for consideration for listing as a State Heritage Place.

6.4 Plaque commemorating 'Thebarton Cottage' (Home of Colonel William Light).

A Summary of State Heritage Object was prepared for the Council's consideration and recommended that the Plaque commemorating 'Thebarton Cottage' (the Home of Colonel William Light) could be provisionally entered in the Register under s16(2)(c) as it is intrinsically related to the heritage significance of two State Heritage Places. The original nomination is provided also.

Council agreed that it is logical to list this as an Object and supported doing so. Council further agreed that the object was intrinsically linked to both the heritage significance of the 'Remains Of 'Thebarton Hall' Colonel William Light's House (Including Underground Room, Underground Tank And Well), 107 Port Road, Thebarton and of Colonel William Light's Grave And Monument, Light Square, Adelaide.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Considered** the evidence provided in the proposed Summary of State Heritage Object for the Plaque Commemorating 'Thebarton Cottage' (The Home Of Colonel William Light) (SHO 26527-01)
- **Provisionally entered** the Plaque Commemorating 'Thebarton Cottage' (The Home Of Colonel William Light) (SHO 26527-01) in the Register as an object intrinsically

related to the heritage significance of the Remains Of 'Theberton Hall' Colonel William Light's House (Including Underground Room, Underground Tank And Well) (SHP 26527), 107 Port Road, Thebarton and of Colonel William Light's Grave And Monument (SHP 14139), Light Square, Adelaide.

- **Approved** the proposed Summary of State Heritage Object for the Plaque Commemorating 'Theberton Cottage' (The Home of Colonel William Light) (SHO 26527-01), 107 Port Road, Thebarton.

6.5 Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex

It was noted that Mrs Deborah Lindsay and Mr Stephen Schrapel returned to the meeting at this point.

Mrs Anna Pope welcomed the representatives of the working group to the meeting being Dr Julien Louys, Associate Professor in Palaeontology and active cave diver; Mr Pete Wolf, Director of the Cave Divers Association of Australia; and Mr Ian Lewis, Geologist and cave diver who works in the Department for Environment and Water.

Pete Wolf – requirement of access to most sites you have to be a member of CDAA.

It was noted that in 2006, the Australian Heritage Council published *Australia's Fossil Heritage: A Catalogue of Important Australian Fossil Sites*. Of the twelve sites identified in South Australia, several have not yet been protected by heritage listing.

Mrs Pope indicated that the Heritage Assessment recommends that the place meets s16 criteria (c) and (g) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* and is eligible for entry as a State Heritage Place in the SA Heritage Register. It is also recommended that the Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex is designated as a place of geological, palaeontological and speleological significance pursuant to section 14 (7) (a) of the *Act*.

The Heritage Assessment Report for the Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex was prepared in collaboration with the following experts:

- Dr Julien Louys, Griffith University
- Mr Pete Wolf and Mr Peter Horne, Cave Divers Association of Australia
- Dr Liz Reed and Dr Diego Garcia-Bellido, University of Adelaide and SA Museum
- Dr Mary-Anne Binnie, Mr Ben McHenry and Mr Neville Pledge, SA Museum
- Dr Trevor Worthy, Dr Rod Wells and Dr Gavin Prideaux, Flinders University
- Mr Ian D Lewis, Mr Steve Bourne and Mrs Anna Pope, SA Department for Environment and Water

The assessment report indicated that the Green Waterhole - Tank Cave Fossil Complex contains the only known extensive underwater vertebrate fossil deposits in Australia. This unique freshwater depositional environment has ensured the preservation of extinct species not found anywhere else, with several additional species new to science recovered and awaiting description.

The underwater deposits have also resulted in a completeness and preservation of fossil assemblies almost unique for Australia. This provides an important opportunity to investigate the evolution of South Australian mammals and birds.

The cave complex also demonstrates rare speleological features, including length of cave passageways, clarity of water, underwater speleothems, and being a type locality for stygofauna. The complex also holds importance for the development of cave diving in the country and is closely associated with the Cave Divers Association of Australia.

Council discussed the criteria recommended in the assessment report and agreed that it meets criterion c) - it may yield information that will contribute to an understanding of the State's history, including its natural history.

Council further agreed this place meets criterion (g) - it has a special association with the life or work of a person or organisation or an event of historical importance, the organisation being the Cave Divers Association of Australia.

The Chairperson asked Council members whether there was any indication that this place may meet criteria a), b), d), e) or f)? The Council agreed with the recommendation that it did not meet the criteria for provisional entry.

Mr Wolf and Mr Lewis spoke about the importance of the CDAA. It was noted that cave diving was banned in Australia after a series of fatalities in the early 1970's. The Cave Diving community now set standards and regulate the sport. Membership of CDAA is a prerequisite to dive sites. It was noted that the development of a mapping, exploration and recording culture came about with the advent of CDAA. Divers have successfully contributed to our understanding of the science and the protection of the fossils.

Tank Cave and Green Waterhole are amplified in significance through their physical connection.

Council supported the intent to consider designation of the site. It was noted that this would be subject to a three-month public consultation period – the same period for the provisional entry of the place.

It was noted that the South East of South Australia has no natural river systems and therefore the waterholes that form the caves were a crucial fresh water supply for the Boandik people. For this reason, the site will be of great significance to them.

Council approved the Summary of State Heritage Place document without amendment.

Council agreed the report is an extraordinary document and a very detailed submission. Council congratulated the nominators for their exemplary work.

Mrs Pope indicated Heritage SA would contact the Native Title Holders to discuss the provisional entry of this place.

Mrs Pope was pleased to note that the SA Fossil Heritage Working Group is going to continue to meet. Ms Megan Thomas will be taking up a three-month internship with Heritage SA and will prepare three reports for Council: two designation statements and a heritage survey of significant fossil sites in SA.

Mr Conlon thanked the representatives of the working group for their expert work and for making the time to attend this meeting.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Provisionally entered** Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex, Princes Highway, Tantanoola, 5280 (SHP 26530), in the South Australian Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place, as it fulfils criteria (c) & (g) for State heritage listing under section 16 (1) of the *Heritage Places Act, 1993*:
 - (c) it may yield information that will contribute to an understanding of the State's history, including its natural history
 - (g) it has a special association with the life or work of a person or organisation or an event of historical importance
- **Agreed** that there is an intent to consider the designation of the Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex as a place of geological, palaeontological and speleological significance, pursuant to section 14(7)(a) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* after a three-month consultation process and any decision to confirm the entry.
- **Approved** the Summary of State Heritage Place for Green Waterhole – Tank Cave Fossil Complex including Statement of Significance, proposed Statements of Designation, and Site Plan.

7 ITEMS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR CONFIRMATION ON THE SA HERITAGE REGISTER

7.1 Holy Cross Catholic Church, 159 -165 Goodwood Road, Millswood

On 18 February 2021, the South Australian Heritage Council (the Council) provisionally entered Holy Cross Catholic Church, 159-165 Goodwood Road, Millswood in the South Australian Heritage Register (the Register) as a State Heritage Place as it meets criteria (d), (e) and (g) under s16 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

Council was asked to note the two submissions received in relation to this place. In relation to the submissions, Mr Burns noted that, with regard to the toilet block, it is only

the clinker bricks comprising the walls that are of significance, due to their material relationship with the church, not the toilet block itself. As the toilet block, in itself, is not a significant part of the place, it was recommended that the Council amend the extent of listing to remove the toilet block.

The significance of the memorial and signboard is its stone form and fabric. The memorial and signboard were deliberately constructed using reclaimed bluestone from the original Holy Cross Church that stood on the site prior to the construction of the present Holy Cross Church. Other fabric from the original church was also deliberately reused elsewhere in the main church.

While the memorial and signboard are significant, their specific siting on the site is not, so including them in the extent of listing would not necessarily prevent them being relocated on the site in future development. The recommendation is to retain the memorial and signboard in the extent of listing, but add the words “excluding location”.

Council agreed to amend the listing and remove the toilet block.

With regard the signpost and church plaque, Council agreed that it is those elements that are important, not necessarily their current location and the assessment process will therefore be better guided by indicating that they do not necessarily have to be located in their current positions on site.

Council agreed to remove two sections of the document:

- Page 5, criterion (e) – Nunyara Chapel paragraph.
- Page 6 and 7, remove the three paragraphs starting with the words ‘There are currently no places.....’

Action: Mr Chris Burns to update Summary of State Heritage Place document and provide out of session for approval.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Considered** the submissions received in relation to the entry of Holy Cross Catholic Church in the South Australian Heritage Register;
- **Confirmed** the entry of Holy Cross Catholic Church, 159-165 Goodwood Road, Millswood (CT 6207/7 F9996 A81, A82, A83, A84, A85; F10001 A101, A102, A103, A104, A105), subject to the amendments described above, in the South

Australian Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place, pursuant to sections 18(4) & 18(5) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* as it satisfies criteria (d), (e) and (g) under section 16(1) of the Act:

- (d) it is an outstanding representative of a particular class of place of cultural significance
 - (e) it demonstrates a high degree of creative, aesthetic or technical accomplishment or is an outstanding representative of particular construction techniques or design characteristics
 - (g) it has special association with the life or work of a person or organisation or an event of historical importance
- **Approved** the Summary of State Heritage Place, including the suggested change to extent of listing subject to agreement via email.

7.2 Piggery Breeding Pens – Loveday Internment Camp Complex, Costello Road, Loveday

On 18 February 2021, the the Council provisionally entered the Piggery Breeding Pens, Loveday Internment Camp Complex, located on Costello Road, Loveday as a State Heritage Place in the South Australia Heritage Register as the Council found it meets criteria (a) and (b) under section 16(1) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993*.

The period for making a public submission closed 3 June 2021. One written submission was received. This submission supported the confirmation of the State heritage listing of the Piggery Breeding Pens, Loveday Internment Camp Complex on the Register under s16 criteria (a) and (b).

Council approved the Summary of State Heritage Place without amendment.

RESOLUTIONS:

The South Australian Heritage Council:

- **Considered** the submission received in relation to the entry of the Piggery Breeding Pens, Loveday Internment Camp Complex in the South Australian Heritage Register;
- **Confirmed** the entry of the Piggery Breeding Pens, Loveday Internment Camp Complex, Costello Road, Loveday (CL 6211/769 Sections 210 and 211, Hundred of Loveday) in the South Australian Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place, pursuant to sections 18(4) & 18(5) of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* as it satisfies criteria (a) and (b) under section 16(1) of the Act:

- (a) it demonstrates important aspects of the evolution or pattern of the State's history
- (b) it has rare, uncommon or endangered qualities that are of cultural significance
- **Approved** the Summary of State Heritage Place.

7.3 Rosetta Head Well and Whaling Station Site, Franklin Parade, Encounter Bay

It was noted that Mr Gavin Leydon departed the meeting at this point.

Ms Kirsty Nield, Heritage South Australia was welcomed to the meeting.

On 10 December 2020, the Council considered the Assessment Report for Rosetta Head Well and Whaling Station Site, Franklin Parade, Encounter Bay. The Assessment Report recommended that the Whaling Station Site met criteria (b) and (c) under section 16 of the *Heritage Places Act 1993* (the Act). After considering the Assessment Report, the Council provisionally entered the Rosetta Head Well and Whaling Station Site in the South Australian Heritage Register (the Register) under criteria (b) and (c).

The three-month period for making a written public submission closed 12 April 2021 and three submissions were received.

Council noted that the submitters suggested reducing the extent of the listing of site and examined their suggestions.

Ms Kirsty Nield noted that the department supports the extent of listing as provisionally entered. The listing proposed is from edge of water. It is difficult to ascertain the extent of the initial whaling site, even with the use of original maps.

Council discussed the benefits of listing the full extent of the site, as provisionally entered, as this would cover the archaeological significance of the full site.

Council were in favour of keeping the original proposed boundary and confirmed the entry without amendment.

It was noted that the headings on page 31 and page 35 (page break matter) would be corrected by Heritage SA.

 - Criterion (c) it may yield information that will contribute to an understanding of the State's history, including its natural history
- **Approved** Archaeological designation of the Rosetta Head Well and Whaling Station Site; and
- **Approved** the Summary of State Heritage Place for Rosetta Head Well and Whaling Station Site, Franklin Parade, Encounter Bay.
