



**AW teamed up with staff from SA Arid Lands Landscape Board to deliver a series of workshops on soil health, vegetation monitoring and carbon farming.**






Led the delivery of the buffel grass Ministerial Roundtable

**AW worked with ranger teams across the region to manage pest plants and animals. Highlights include:**

- 5 community workshops on buffel control
- 6 presentations, 4 ministerial briefings and a ministerial roundtable on the social, environmental & economic threats of buffel grass
- Annual camel cull in the Great Victoria Desert
- A network of 4G-connected Celium traps installed on Yalata coast to control feral predators

**Aerial LiDAR mapping identified 400 possible new nganamara mounds**


- 234 GPS waypoints visited on foot





## Revenue 2024-25




## Support provided to community and board in 2024-25
