#### **Program highlights this period**

• Landscape officers attended the AIR EP *Medium Rainfall Research, Development and Extension Committee* Meeting in Cummins in March. The Committee discussed key agricultural issues facing the medium rainfall areas of lower Eyre Peninsula, and prioritised upcoming activities for this year.

#### Local government engagement for this period

• Working in conjunction with the District Council of Lower Eyre Peninsula, a workshop was held with landholders around the Kapinnie area to discuss a range of local issues, including approaches to pest plant and animal control.

# Pest plant and animal control

#### Sub-program

Monitor and facilitate management of priority pest plants and animals

## Program highlights this period

#### **Pest plants**

- Landscape officers have been trialling a new tool in the fight against woody weeds. The BioHerbicides
  Di-Bak Injecta delivers capsules containing a chemical compound directly into the tree stem, and our
  initial trials have focused on Aleppo Pines, White Weeping Broom, Opuntia and Olives. We will be
  looking to expand this trial to other species in the coming months.
- Landscape officers have continued to provide advice regarding best practice control methods for pest plants to landholders. We have also continued to assist with identifying plants that have been brought in by landholders.
- Site visits were conducted to properties with known Silverleaf Nightshade infestations as part of annual compliance activity. Inspections are needed to ensure landholders are controlling this serious weed.
- All known roadside sites of **Silverleaf Nightshade** were surveyed (eight sites). Only two sites out of the eight had Silverleaf Nightshade. All plants were controlled. One site was revisited a month later to control new seedlings that had popped up.

**Status** 

- Planning for annual **Gorse** control has begun with the district Gorse Action Plan drafted and all landholders sent compliance letters detailing the need to control any plants on their land.
- African Boxthorn control was implemented around a Hooded Plover nesting territories and in saltmarsh sites at Cape Euler and Redcliffs south of Tumby Bay (STAR Project).

#### **Pest animals**

#### • Rabbits

Landscape Officers have continued to assist landholders with rabbit baiting programs. Due to the lack of rain and resulting dry conditions, the appropriate window for rabbit baiting has extended beyond the usual timeframes. Over 400 kg of 1080 oats have been manufactured to assist with these baiting programs and several landholders have been utilising the Board's free bait hire loan program.

#### • Goats

A report was made to a landscape officer about two goats that were untagged and roaming on the outskirts of Port Lincoln. The landholder was advised of their responsibilities for keeping goats (a declared species) under the Landscapes Act.

#### • Deer

Landscape Officers have continued to progress with priority compliance regarding deer, including deer fence inspections at farms across lower Eyre Peninsula. A number of feral deer sightings have also been received.

#### • Foxes

- Fox bait distribution days have been held at a number of sites across lower Eyre Peninsula. Dozens of landholders have collected thousands of 1080 baits that will assist with fox control across lower Eyre Peninsula.
- Landscape Officers have continued to support DEW by assisting with their fox bait production.
   Landscape Officers injected around 4,000 baits that will be distributed through Lincoln and Coffin
   Bay National Parks in conjunction with their aerial baiting program.

- Landscape officers worked with coastal landholders to undertake a co-ordinated targeted baiting program that ran for four weeks adjacent to Hooded Plover nesting territories in lower eastern EP at Golf Club Beach, Cape Euler and Bolingbroke north. Our program was also enhanced by six adjoining landholders who undertook their own fox baiting program or trapping at the same time (STAR Project).
- Surveying of fox dens in the coastal reserve has also commenced, with plans to close fox dens before the next Hooded Plover nesting season (STAR Project).

#### **Program highlights this period**

#### Acacia whibleyana

 Establishment of cutting propagation protocol of Whibley Wattle

This project was initiated by the University of Adelaide in response to priority needs for *Acacia whibleyana* conservation identified through existing partnerships with the Eyre Peninsula Landscape Board. Landscape staff have assisted with the collection of propagation material that was sent to Adelaide to create a clonal research sub-population at the University of Adelaide's Waite Arboretum for conservation trials. Any additional clones will be used to establish clonal insurance populations at alternative locations to existing stands or transplanted into local stands. A total 1,250 Whibley Wattle cuttings were propagated from three subpopulations.

### Birdlife Australia's Federally-funded National Landcare Program (NLP) project *Protect the Hooded Plover*, on the southern Eyre Peninsula.

In addition to the Hooded Plover monitoring and conservation work we do under our STAR project, the Board is also contracted by BirdLife Australia to deliver Hooded

Plover monitoring and conservation work under their federal-funded NLP <u>Protect the Hooded Plover</u> project. Under this project staff and volunteers monitor an additional eight priority Hooded Plover nesting sites, plan and implement intervention actions at these sites when needed to protect nesting birds and chicks, and help coordinate and deliver the National Hooded Plover Biennial Count for southern Eyre Peninsula.

• Fortnightly monitoring of the eight Hooded Plover nesting territories continued. A four-week fox baiting program was implemented as an intervention action with the aim of improving breeding outcomes at three nesting territories, Black Rocks, Cape Hardy and Bolingbroke South. A total of 17 baits were taken.

- Landscape officers assisted Lower Eyre Coastcare repair damage that occurred over the Christmas/New Year holiday period to coastal sites around Greenly and Coles Point.
- Maintenance of fences designed to assist in the protection of sand dunes from erosion was completed at Moonlight Bay.
