## Book your cultural education session for Term 1 & 2, 2025

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board is coordinating a Nature Education program for schools in collaboration with First Nations cultural educators from Kaurna, Narungga, Ngadjuri and Nukunu Nations.

This program is available for schools in the council areas of Yorke Peninsula, Copper Coast, Barunga West, Northern Areas, Clare & Gilbert Valleys, Wakefield, Adelaide Plains, Light, Gawler, Barossa, Goyder, Peterborough, Orroroo/Carrieton, Mount Remarkable and Port Pirie.

Our focus is helping to link regional schools with cultural educators, to support cultural awareness-building for children and the connection of First Nations' knowledge with environmental stewardship.

We have provided a list of Kaurna, Narungga, Ngadjuri and Nukunu cultural educators with their activities and year level and group size preferences below.

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board is supporting this program by providing a 50%

discount off each session booked. Each school will need to contact the Board to arrange and book a cultural educator session for Term 1 and 2 2025. Payment will be arranged between the presenter and the school, and then we will reimburse the school for the discount.
