

SA KANGAROO PARTNERSHIP PROJECT



Over 23 organisations committed to Kangaroo Partnership Project

The Kangaroo Partnership Project has completed its fundamental first stage with the creation of a formal partnership model equipped to tackle the challenges presented by unsustainable kangaroo populations across South Australia.

The formal partnership was achieved through a series of stakeholder engagement workshops in April, which resulted in over 23 organisations signing partnership agreements committing to the project at various capacities including:

This level of interest reinforces the desire many stakeholders have to be a part of the solutions associated with kangaroo management in SA. The project also benefits from linkages

with DEW's Kangaroo Management Reference Group and the Kangaroo Agricultural Taskforce.

The workshops were designed to increase understanding of the issues and opportunities, strengthen project goals, and foster co-ownership of the partnership among stakeholders.

More than 50 cross-sector representatives from around the state attended the two-part online workshop series, including from the kangaroo industry, conservation, animal welfare, land managers and government.

Participants indicated a broad spread of interest across areas related to kangaroo management, including environmental conservation, landscape management and sustainability, social licence, economic development and livelihoods, and animal welfare. These interests are reflected in the themes and focus areas of the partnership that have been identified and co-developed by workshop stakeholders (see KPP Fact Sheet).

The workshops ended with a one-word reflection from all participants, which indicated that everyone felt hopeful and optimistic about the contribution that the Kangaroo Partnership Project can make in this space.


To share a bit about me...I am an ecologist turned environmental social scientist, with a particular interest in strategic communication planning and design.

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Funding opportunity from the Kangaroo Partnership

Stakeholders who participated in the workshop series contributed more than 20 project ideas at various stages of development.

To provide an opportunity to test these ideas, a new grant-funding program has been developed which will be overseen by the Kangaroo Partnership Project Steering Committee and SA Arid Lands Landscape Board.

Funding for up to \$15,000 per project is available for kangaroo management projects relating, but not limited to, trials and demonstrations, research and development, education and awareness raising, and innovative ideas.

Project ideas may apply to sectors such as farming, conservation and landscape management, animal welfare, and industry operations, or a collaboration between a number of sector partners.

Consideration of increased funding amounts (up to a maximum of \$30,000) may be given to projects that demonstrate significant collaboration between organisations, businesses and individuals in the sector, in an effort to encourage a shared responsibility for creating long-term solutions.

A total funding pool of \$90,000 is available for the 2022-23 financial year.

Funding will be awarded to projects addressing the five priority areas of the Kangaroo Partnership Project:

- 1. Animal welfare
- 2. Economic development and livelihoods
- 3. Environmental conservation, landscape management and sustainability
- 4. Improving social licence (community understanding and acceptance)
- 5. Moving forward together, engagement and alignment

Funding will be awarded on merit to projects that demonstrate the best value for money and delivery of benefits in-line with Kangaroo Partnership Project priorities.

All potential funding applicants are encouraged to reach out to discuss their application with the Kangaroo Partnership Coordinator.

Grants are <u>now open</u> and close 5:00pm 9 September 2022.
